AGED RESIDENT DIES SUDDENLY

Levi W. Lott, 84 Years Old, Succumbs at Home of His Son.

Levi W. Lott, one of the oldest and best known residents of Mishawaka died very suddenly at the home of his son, William T. Lott, with whom he made his home for the past seven months, Monday afternoon.

Mr. Lott's mind had been failing for the past year but he was able to be about the farm until he was suddenly stricken at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon and died before the doctor could arrive.

He was born Sept. 22, 1831, in Adams county, Pa., being 84 years, 3 months and 5 days old. He came to this city when twenty-one years old, and has resided here ever since. He taught school in the country around Mishawaka for 22 years and then later followed his trade of miller for some time, after which he purchased the dry line which business he followed until old age caused him to retire from business.

June 7, 1862, he was married to Miss Eliza A. Van Buskirk, who died Jan. 25, 1912. He united with the Presbyterian church when but a young man and has always been a regular attendant, until his hearing failed.

He is survived by three sons and one daughter, William T. Lott at whose home he died, Charles W. Lott

CARRIES DRUNK CASE TO HIGHER COURTS

Three Michigan Men Each Plead Guilty and Are Fined \$10 and Costs.

The case of Jacob Giracazyk, charged with public intoxication and arrested Sunday evening about 8 o'clock on E. Joseph st., proved more or less interesting in the city court Tuesday morning. Giracazyk asserted that he was not drunk when arrested and had several witnesses present to testify in his behalf. Witnesses were also produced by the state and after an hour of trial, Judge Feig found him guilty and assessed him a fine of \$10 and costs amounting to \$15. An appeal was taken to the circuit court.

Each of the three men, Gene Wolfgang, Anson Mayer and Loren James all of Michigan, arrested last Friday at Elkhart for the local police on charges of grand larceny, pleaded guilty in the city police court Tuesday morning. A plea for leniency was made by Deputy Prosecutor Sam Schwartz on the grounds that the billiard balls were taken because of a mischievous motive and not because of a desire to commit a theft. However, the charge being of a serious nature, the three men were given a severe lecture by Judge Feig and assessed a fine of \$10 and costs amounting to \$20 each and a suspended jail sentence. The fines were paid and the men, accompanied by their wives left the court.

WAR ORDER EXPORTS STILL ON THE INCREASE

Business Letter by Local Institution Gives Some Interesting Data.

The monthly business letter for January issued by the Mishawaka Trust and Savings Co., says the rising tide of war order exports shows no signs of recession. September, the latest month recorded, registers immense increases in many items. For example, in September, 1914, explosives were exported to the value of \$735,910, while in September, 1915, the value was \$18,285,457. Automobile exports also show an enormous increase, from \$1,235,810 in September, 1914, to \$10,711,132 in September, 1915. Many other items such as chemicals, aeroplanes, machine tools, leather, shoes and wire, show immense increases, the total for the first nine months of 1915 being \$59,990,000, compared with \$15,270,000 for the corresponding period of 1914.

The report further states that one of the most interesting features of the present day business development is the close relationship which exists between financial institutions and the public. This relationship has been brought about mainly by the breadth and thoroughness of the service which financial institutions render to their customers. Many details of service rendered, while not readily apparent, are nevertheless very vital and people in all walks of life are appreciating more and more each year the importance of establishing and maintaining close and active connections with reliable financial institutions.

Another step in the advance of the United States as the world's banker has recently been taken by the establishment of dollar exchange with Australasia. This new relationship should receive the full support of all American shippers and will be of much interest to exporters of goods to the antipodes who sustained severe losses of exchange owing to the steady decline in value of the pound sterling during the transit period between Australasia and the United States.
