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HAM BAKED WITH CIDER.

Let a choice ham stand covered with cold water over night; drain and set over the fire in a fresh supply of cold water; let heat slowly to the boiling point, then simmer four hours.

POTATO BISQUE, OR PUREE OF POTATO.

Materials—Two cups boiled potato, one cup boiled onion, two cups hot milk, one tablespoonful butter, two tablespoonfuls flour, one cup cream.

FRENCH ROLLS.

Materials—One pint milk, two eggs, one teaspoonful salt, three pints flour, three tablespoonfuls butter, one yeast cake, two teaspoonfuls sugar.

OXTAIL SOUP.

Materials—Two tablespoonfuls drippings or lard, two oxtails, one large onion, one carrot, two sprigs parsley, one bayleaf, two stalks celery, two quarts cold water or stock, two tablespoonfuls pearl barley, one tablespoonful flour, two tablespoonfuls cold water, one-fourth cupful sherry, salt and pepper or cayenne.

boiling, put in the barley and simmer four hours. Remove the large bones, celery, parsley, and bayleaf, and thicken the soup with the flour rubbed smooth with two tablespoonfuls of cold water.

SAUTED EGGPLANT. Materials—Two tablespoonfuls clarified butter, eggplant sliced in slices one-fourth inch thick, flour and white pepper.

Directions—Have the milk lukewarm; add to it the well-beaten eggs and salt. Sift the flour and rub the butter into it; mix the yeast and sugar together, working them with the back of a teaspoon until the yeast liquifies, then pour it into the milk and egg and add all these to the flour.

Directions—Melt the fat and fry in it the carrot and onion cut into dice, also the oxtails which have been cut in half, a crown, adding the water, also the celery, parsley and bayleaf tied together.
