STOVE EXPLODES AND BADLY INJURES WOMAN

Over-heated Boiler is Cause. Victim Badly Scalded on Arms and Chest.

News-Times Special Service: PORT WAYNE, Ind., Jan. 18.—Mrs. Herman Leuschner, 1613 Home av., is in the Lutheran hospital today suffering from severe burns about the face, chest and arms as the result of a peculiar explosion of the kitchen stove in her home yesterday morning about 11:20 o'clock.

The range in the Leuschner kitchen was provided with a boiler used for heating purposes. This boiler had no safety valve. Yesterday morning, because of the cold weather, an exceptionally heavy fire was built in the range early in the morning. This fire was kept blazing while the family went to church. When they returned, Mrs. Leuschner went directly to the kitchen, and it was then that the boiler let go.

The stove was demolished. Flat irons on the range were tossed into the air and struck the ceiling, knocking out portions of the plaster, and fire from the stove was thrown to all parts of the room. Mrs. Leuschner was directly in the path of the escaping steam and her hands and arms were scalded as the result of this fact.

KILLS SELF WHILE HIS FRIENDS ARE NEAR HIM

Grip Victim Drives Knife Into Body Dozen Times and Dies.

News-Times Special Service: CADILLAC, Mich., Jan. 18.—After 10 days of illness with the grip and pneumonia, Leonard Proctor, 45 years old, Missaukee county farmer, stabbed himself to death in bed while two friends sat beside him unaware of what he had done. Proctor had asked one for a knife with which to trim his finer nails. Taking it, he buried himself under the quilts and jabbed himself a dozen times without attracting attention. His friends found him dead a few minutes later.

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UPHOLDS CITY COURT

Judge Declares Municipal Tribunals Are Constitutional.

News-Times Special Service: BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Jan. 18.—The constitutionality of Battle Creek's municipal courts was upheld by Circuit Judge Walter H. North in a decision denying Atty. Henry J. Barton's motion to dismiss the case against his client, Samuel Misserlis. Barton alleged that local acts which conflict with the statute are not binding and therefore Misserlis charged with violating the local option law, was not legally given a hearing. Judge North ruled that the constitution also provides for the city charter and home rule and that Misserlis underwent a legal examination.

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350 CHILDREN CLIMB FIRE ESCAPE TO SAFETY

Small Blaze Drives Rochester Pupils Out in Six Below Zero Weather.

TENNIS STARS BRANDED PROFESSIONALS
