NEW YORK FANS LIKE CHAMPION

Jess Handles Self Well and Has Developed a Splendid Left Stab.

By Frank G. Menke. International News Service. NEW YORK, Feb. 29.—Jess Willard looks—and acts like a real champion in his workouts here for his 16-round quarrel with Frank Moran on March 25.

"The champion stole some of Jack Johnson's stuff, that's what he did," ventured a bystander at Willard's initial workout in Gotham. And that's the opinion among the "experts" who have seen him in action. "The Willard of today exhibits cleverness far beyond that which he possessed when he snatched the heavyweight crown from the black man in Havana nearly 11 months ago. He is much faster than he was in Cuba, despite the fact that he is a bit bulky amidships and slightly soft in the arms and shoulders. He has become quite shifty, too, and uses blocking, ducking and feinting methods that Johnson seemed to have forgotten.

"Did you train in secret and learn a few of Johnson's tricks?" Willard was asked. "The heavyweight king grinned and said: 'Well, I'll answer that by saying that I never have quit training since the day I beat Johnson. But it hasn't been strenuous training—just enough to keep me in shape. I don't suppose the public knew that I was doing some work every day and that's why so many wild stories got around about my weighing anywhere from 300 pounds to half a ton.

"Fighting is my profession, I aimed to become the best in my line and so, naturally, I have tried to develop speed and cleverness. How well I have succeeded is something for the spectators to decide."

Before he became champion he always was mantled with an air of a man not sure of himself, who fears that the worst is going to happen—and looks for it to happen. Willard has acquired a left stab since the Johnson fight. In the other years of his career he used his left almost wholly for jabbing purposes serving the right for the "clean-up" wallop. That's what he did in the Johnson fracas. But now Willard is in our midst with a left-handed punch that seems to have the same crushing force that is behind his right.

"I hold Moran in high regard," said Willard. "I think he is the one man in the ring who is entitled to a chance at the title—and that's why he is getting it. I realize that Moran has a powerful right-hander, but I am developing a defense which I feel will turn back those attacks."

He started shifting his men about yesterday and he will endeavor to get a line on his most suitable combination before outdoor practice starts.

Tom Spalding, an inter-hall and freshman star of last year, turned out for the first time and was used at the second base position. Spalding is a shortstop, but he may fit in better at the second sack. At least Coach Harper is giving him a try at that position.

Harper has practically given up the idea of making a catcher out of Corcoran, substitute infielder last year, and he worked him at shortstop for a while yesterday. Frank Rydzewski, the football tackle, who reported for practice Saturday, was given a shot at first base yesterday.

Harper continues to use Ward on first, Wolfe at shortstop and Kline at third base in the daily workouts, and the three men are looking good. "Chief" Meyers, shortstop on the 1914 team, who will be tried at first base this year, turned out for practice for the first time yesterday and limbered up a bit. Meyers is not yet able to get around good on his bad ankle and it will be several days before he will get into the active work.

FUTURE OF BRESNAHAN IS STILL IN DOUBT

Expects to Wind Up Affairs With Weeghman Today on Back Salary.

CHICAGO, Feb. 29.—Mystery Monday surrounded the movements of Roger Bresnahan and his connection with the future of the orphaned franchise of the American association and its proposed transfer back to Toledo. It was reliably stated that Bresnahan was in Chicago and expected to meet Charles Weeghman Tuesday, winding up affairs with the Cub leader which would leave him free to purchase the franchise. That much was confirmed by Mr. Weeghman, but later there came word from Toledo quoting Bresnahan as saying he had abandoned all hope of getting the franchise. It is understood that Mr. Weeghman has declined to pay in a lump sum the \$20,000 due Bresnahan for the two years remaining of his contract with the Chicago Nationals. He and the former west side leader, he said, would meet Tuesday and settle their differences.
