NO WATCHMEN WANTED FOR TURNIP PATCH

Objectors to Annexation Bill Prepare to Fight Action of Council in Circuit Court.

"We maintain our turnip patch can get along well enough without police or fire protection," was the reply of George Allemang, one of the protestants in the annexation suit against the city of Mishawaka.

Allemang, representing 22 east side protestants, and D. M. McKinley, representing nearly a like number of north side protestants, were down town conferring with attorneys regarding the proceedings entered in the circuit court Saturday against the council.

The annexed property comprises

1,200 acres and the market value of this property, protestants claim, is nearly \$1,000,000. This territory protestants aver is made up of farm lands, railroad trackage and the Hen island power plant.

"If by raising the tax on our farms 50 per cent—as will doubtless be done if this annexation matter is permitted to stand—we could get potatoes 50 per cent larger we would not object," complained one of the protestants last night. "The city council, unhappily makes us no such promise and we can't see where we come in on this thing outside of paying the extra taxation."

Attorneys for the protestants point out that with the addition of \$1,000,000 to the tax duplicate which now totals approximately \$7,000,000, the condition of the city treasury would be materially improved with benefits to the annexed populace practically negligible.


