N. D. BASEBALL MEN GET OUTSIDE

Snowstorm Drives Squad in During Afternoon—Football Training Opens.

Coach Harper's Notre Dame baseball candidates enjoyed their first workout in the open yesterday morning only to be driven indoors again for the afternoon session by the snow storm which brought to an end the pleasant weather of the past few days.

Nevertheless, the storm of the afternoon did not put a damper on plans for special football practice. Despite the snow, 25 candidates for the 1916 varsity eleven reported to Assistant Coach Rockne and were put through the first phases of spring training on the Carroll hall athletic field.

Fundamentals Are Taught.
Coach Rockne was busy during the fore part of the afternoon handing out suits to the football men. Later, however, he and his corps of aids put a halt to it. The spring preliminary training stunts, such as falling on the ball, starting, and passing the oval. The kickers booted the ball around a bit and limbered their legs for future hard work.

The spring practice will be a daily affair from now on until athletic officials call a halt to it. The spring work is for all candidates for next fall's team who are not members of the track or baseball squads. In his work of coaching the men, Rockne is being assisted by several veterans. Captain Fitzgerald of the 1915 team, and Keefe, his teammate at guard, both of whom will be graduated this June, are in charge of the linemen. Edward and Baujan, the ends last fall, are coaching the wing candidates, and Captain Stanley Coffal of the 1916 team is handling the backfield aspirants. Edward will also be graduated from Notre Dame this year.

Get Batting Practice.
The outdoor work for the baseball men yesterday morning consisted for the most part, of batting practice. Coach Harper, however, saw to it that his outfielders secured some practice at catching fly balls and it was the first chance the outer gardeners have had of pulling the pill out of the air this year. The practice was held on the Carroll hall diamond.

Although the snow prevented outdoor work in the afternoon, Harper took his men in the gymnasium and gave them a fast drill. Infield practice took up the major portion of the time, although the coach gave considerable attention to his pitchers and catchers.

As soon as the weather permits, Harper will take his diamond candidates outdoors permanently. He wants to get as early a start as possible this year as the Hoosiers have a hard early season schedule.

ANOTHER HURLER LANDED BY SMITH

Carpenter of Battle Creek to Get Chance—Meister and Whiting Send Contracts.

"Dutch" Meister, who has been carrying around an unsigned contract in his pocket for the past several weeks, brought joy to the heart of Mr. Ed Smith Wednesday, when the certificate bearing his name was presented to the local office.

The New York Giants are to play in South Bend on Aug. 17 according to present arrangements. The contract has not been signed but the Giant management has promised to bring the team here on that date. The Benders are scheduled to play at Dayton that day, but the game will either be postponed or staged as a part of a double bill.

Smith Busy Man.
Mr. Smith was a busy man on Wednesday. He donned his overalls and was out to the ball park aiding in moving the grandstand and laying out the bleachers. The grandstand is to be on the south side of the park on Lincoln W., and the players will bat north. This will do away with the sun field and is expected to be a great improvement over the old arrangement.

Smith has finally completed a mass of details in arranging for the park and with the Central league schedule adopted, promises to be one busy man from now until after the season is brought to a close. He is adding players one at a time and will have a good looking bunch here next month. Every department is well cared for excepting the hurriers, but Ed still has about six weeks before the season opens and should be able to land some good men by then.

Grand Rapids is expected to come to the aid of Owner Essick and grant him free use of Island park which is owned by the city. Essick has been paying \$500 a year for the grounds, but has agreed to permit the use of the park by high school teams free of charge. The proposal is up to the council committee and is expected to be passed on favorably.

George Beal, the Benders' first sacker last season, was scheduled to leave with the Toledo Mud Hens Wednesday for Dayton Springs, Ky., where the team is to train. But "Hal" is not expected to last long, as George Stovall has been secured to hold down the first base job.
