MAYOR TO NEGOTIATE FOR LOWER GAS RATE

Council Empowers Executive to Act in City in Gas Company Case.

A resolution empowering Mayor R. W. Gaylor to act in conjunction with Mayor Keller of South Bend, in an effort to secure lower gas rates for the two cities was the principal item of business adopted at the regular meeting of the council Monday night.

In this resolution introduced by City Attorney R. H. Jernegan the mayor is authorized to act with Mayor Keller and secure the services of a competent engineer, who will appraise the property of the Northern Indiana Gas and Electric Company, and will appear as witnesses in the case now before the public service commission.

The mayor is authorized to enter into a contract with the company with a view of securing lower rates of the citizens of the two cities. What with the sentiment voiced at the recent meeting of the citizens of South Bend and Mishawaka, it is thought that the efforts of the two mayors should prove fruitful.

Councilman Nettleton brought up the case of the citizens residing in the vicinity of the McKinley Oil Co., who several months ago protested against the company placing an old barn next to the oil vats. The matter was referred to the grievance committee at the time, and Chairman Zimmerman reported that the state fire marshal had been communicated with but that he had taken no action. Mayor Gaylor said that he had had assurances that a representative of the state office would be in Mishawaka within the next 30 days.

Claims to the amount of \$4,701.27 were allowed by the council.

"SAG" CHRISTOPH WILL LEAVE FOR WASHINGTON

Bishop McDowell Listens to Appeal of Methodist Memorial Body.

This was decided on at the Northern Indiana Methodist conference, which has been in session at Fort Wayne for the past several days, at the Monday afternoon meeting. During the evening Mrs. Edwards received a telegram from her husband conveying the intelligence.

The news that Dr. Edwards will remain at least another year in the

city will be received throughout the community with the greatest satisfaction. This will mark the fifth successive year he has labored in Mishawaka, and to his credit it is said, he has since coming here, done yeoman work in building up one of the largest congregations to be found in any city the size of Mishawaka in northern Indiana. The growth of the church membership, the Men's Bible class, the Sunday school and the many agencies for good affiliated with the Methodist body in Mishawaka, has been phenomenal under his charge, and to him personally is credited this condition by his congregation.

In the matter of giving, the local church has an enviable record. It has the distinction of contributing more to foreign missions than any other Methodist body in northern Indiana, and to other causes its record has been most liberal. The congregation of the Methodist Memorial church is to be congratulated on being able to retain Dr. Edwards, more especially in view of the fact that several churches in large metropolitan centers have let him go as pastor.

MAYOR URGES ELEVATION BE NEXT ISSUE

from \$5,558.52 on Jan. 1st to \$49.85 on Jan. 1st, 1916.
"The operating cost plus office and station labor for the past two years has decreased \$13,141.07 over the two former years of a decrease equivalent to 17 per cent. The increase of the receipts amounting to \$27,552.39 added to the decrease in operation of \$13,141.07, makes a net gain of \$40,693.46.
"During the past two years the receipts have been increased \$8,000 on account of requiring consumers to pay for services which they had not been paying for but were receiving.
"The decrease in operating expenses have been largely due to the efficient plant we now have and to efficient management. The increase in the receipts is due largely to requiring prompt payment of all bills. A discount of 5 per cent has been given the past year for prompt payment of bills. The actual amount of water during the past year was over 70,000,000 gallons less than any of the three former years, the decrease amounting to about 4 per cent.
"The average pressure for the year as shown by the superintendent's reports has increased about 15 pounds over the average for the three former years or an increase of 20 per cent. Comparative prices paid for material the last four years will be found in the most excellent report of the superintendent. The metering of all connections should be carried out as rapidly as possible. The number of meters in use have doubled in the past four years.
Recommend Meter.
"Citizens paying a flat rate are urged to make application for a meter. If leaks are stopped immediately a meter will be found economical for the consumer as well as the department.
"The rate to consumers is less than is charged by the private plants in the state and in addition service amounting to about \$50,000 annually for fire protection and other municipal purposes has been furnished free. The indebtedness on the plant is small compared to its value. The inventory shows a value in round numbers of \$1,400,000. The bonded indebtedness is \$198,000."
