

Cinnamon Fern (Hardy). Very many uses for this fern in odd corners about the house and yard.

Calycanthus, sweet-scented shrub. This spicy wooded plant, though a native of the South, grows splendidly here, an old favorite, strawberry-scented.

Duetzia, Pride of Rochester, 3 to 7 feet. Beautiful in bloom, though formal in habit.

Duetzia, Rosen, extra heavy pink and white. Duetzia is best adapted to the garden and along borders than the lawn.

Dogwood (Red). This shrub has bright red twigs which are attractive in summer and pretty to look at in winter.

Spiraea (Van Houttei) Bridal Wreath. Very popular and very much loved by all. One of the prettiest bushes out-of-doors.

Snowball, old favorite. Fine old-fashioned flowers, 30 yard complete without a snowball bush.

Syringa (Mock Orange) extra strong. Sweet syringa that scents the whole yard and neighborhood. Flowers white, fragrant, beautiful.

Spiraea (Pink) 2 to 3 feet. Pink bridal wreath that adds a dash of color to the landscape. A distinct and pleasing shade.
