BOARD TALKS

Improvement of Michigan St. and Business District is Discussed.

Beautifulization of South Bend's business section and the consideration of the source of revenue for improvements necessary toward this end comprised the principal business which was brought before an open meeting of the board of public works in the city council chambers last night. The meeting was well attended and foremost among those in the audience were men prominent in business and professional lines here.

Uniform cluster lighting of the business section and streets leading into this section, the removal of the street car company's poles on Michigan st., as an initiative toward the removal of poles over the downtown district, the completing of all excavating before paving of Michigan st., and the question of what kind of material should be used on the main thoroughfare were discussed.

Morris Presides.

E. M. Morris, president of the board of works, presided at the meeting. Several prominent business men discussed informally the matters at issue. No action was taken by the board at the open meeting, and those matters discussed came up for brief consideration at a closed session of the body which followed the adjournment of the first session.

In the curb lighting discussion, the matter was broached with the presentation of a petition signed by 408 taxpayers, representing some of the most powerful and influential interests in the locality. This petition asked for the completing of a uniform lighting plan covering especially the downtown streets. The city was also asked to take over the expense of this system and to pay for the installation of necessary equipment.

Present Blueprints.

Blueprints were presented with the petitions, showing that the plan of the business men to install cluster lights at their own expense had not been carried out throughout the radius of certain streets. The blueprints showed 92 posts to be installed, whereas 105 now are in operation. The present system was installed at the expense of the business men and the upkeep is cared for by them.

In urging the completion of the system to a point of uniformity, and the payment by the city of the upkeep expense, it was pointed out by the merchants that the lighting system was of benefit to the entire city, that it was an advertisement for the guest from out of town, that it was enjoyed by citizens in general.

Councilmen Favorable.

Councilmen Lang and Walters, present at the session, were applauded when they said they were in favor of the lighting and that they thought an extra appropriation would be forthcoming if the matter was presented in the right way by the board of works. The sentiment of the board seemed hardly encouraging to the furthering of the lighting project, in that the expense would be too great. It was held the system would cost for operation \$6,000 more than the present lighting plan.

The lighting system is wanted on the following streets:

On Michigan from Lasalle to Monroe st.; on Main st. from Lasalle to Wayne; on Colfax from Main to Michigan; on Washington st. from the alley west of Main to Michigan; on Jefferson from the alley west of Main to St. Joseph; on Wayne from Main to Michigan.

Favorable Pole Plan.

In the matter of the removal of poles from Michigan st., a majority of the board seemed hardly encouraging to the furthering of the lighting project, in that the expense would be too great. It was held the system would cost for operation \$6,000 more than the present lighting plan.
