

HAITIEN CABINET RESIGNS IN ROW

Constitution Leads to Dissension Among Members. Make Protest to U. S.

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti, May 5.—The Haitian cabinet has resigned. Parliament has entered a protest with the American government and congress against what it declares to be a violation of the rights of the legislative branch of the government.

Pres't Dartiguenave of Haiti and his cabinet have been in controversy with the Haitian parliament over the course to be taken with regard to the framing of a new constitution to conform with the treaty between Haiti and the United States. The president and the cabinet, according to a dispatch from Port-Au-Prince on April 29, threatened to resign if the deputies and senators declined to abide by the presidential decree dissolving the senate, and persisted in continuing to assume legislative

powers instead of meeting merely as a body designated to frame the new constitution.

Rear Admiral Caperton, commanding the American forces in Haiti, took a definite stand in support of Pres't Dartiguenave when the legislators refused to accept the dissolution decree, which the admiral held to be valid, a later dispatch declared.

FRENCH FISHING SMACK IS SUBMARINE VICTIM

Bernadette Sunk 150 Miles From Land—26 Men Reported Adrift.

LONDON, May 5.—The sinking of a French fishing vessel 150 miles from land by a submarine is reported in an official communication issued Thursday. The communication says:

"The French fishing steamer Bernadette was sunk in the Atlantic by an enemy submarine May 1, when 156 miles from the nearest land. The crew of 34 escaped in boats. Eight of the crew were picked up. Twenty-six are still adrift."

Rural Credit Bill Passes in Senate 58-5

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The Hollis farm loan bill, embodying the administration plan for establishing a system of rural credits, passed the senate Thursday night by a vote of 58 to 5.

Sens Brandegee, Lodge, Oliver, Page and Wadsworth, all republicans, voted against the measure.

The bill, after two weeks of debate, passed the senate practically as reported by the banking committee. An amendment by Sen. Smoot, reducing the salaries of the farm loan board from \$10,000 to \$7,500, which was adopted by a vote of 26 to 25 in the committee of the whole, was reconsidered when the bill reached the senate and was defeated 29 to 31, although eight democratic senators voted with the republicans for the reduction.

"PREPAREDNESS" PLANS DELAYED

Failure of Senate—House Conferees to Agree Halts Progress.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The administration today confronted an executive tangle which threatened seriously to delay the enactment of the land defense portion of the president's preparedness program.

The conference committee of the house and senate on the army reorganization bill gave up all efforts to reconcile the differences between the two branches and Chairman Hay of the house conferees prepared to ask the house for further instructions. The conferees were unable to effect any sort of an agreement on two disputed points in the measure. These were the senate plan for an army of federal volunteers and the house proposal of a plan to manufacture nitrogen for explosives from the air.

U. S. TO MEDIATE IN KEY MEN'S TROUBLES

Head of Telegraphers' Organization Believes N. Y. Central Differences Will be Adjusted.

Associated Press Service: NEW YORK, May 5.—An announcement here Thursday night that the New York Central Railroad Co. officially had accepted the offer of the government to mediate in the threatened strike of 5,000 telegraphers and signal men on lines between New York and Chicago was followed by a statement from H. B. Perham, head of the telegraphers' organization, that he did not think a strike call would be issued pending the negotiations. Mr. Perham added that he expected all differences would be adjusted. Mr. Perham declared himself in favor of mediation and said as soon as he had obtained the consent of the executive committee of the union at Cleveland, O., a formal acceptance of the government's offer would be made.

DEMOCRATIC EDITORS PLAN PRESS BUREAU

Will Conduct Coming Campaign—Scribes Will Meet Monthly.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 5.—Pains for the organization of a press bureau for the coming campaign were discussed at a conference of democratic editors here today. Arrangements were made for monthly meetings of the editors. The details of the press work will be arranged by a committee composed of Charles J. Arnold of the GreenCastle Herald, W. S. Chambers of the Newcastle Democrat, J. O. Behymer of the Tipton Times, and Bernard Korbly, chairman of the democratic state committee. The committee will meet tomorrow and select a man to head the press bureau.


Fear of Coal Strike Passes; Scale Accepted

Pittsburgh, Pa., May 5.—The anthracite coal controversy which threatened to cause a strike of the 176,000 mine workers in the hard coal region came to an end Thursday through the ratification by the miners' convention of the agreement recently reached between the scale committee of operators and miners at New York. The delegates accepted the new scale, involving increased wages, shorter hours and virtual recognition of the union by a vote of 581 to 264. The agreement takes the place of the one that expires on March 31. It will be retroactive to that date, and will continue for four years.
