FILES ANSWER IN \$10,000 DAMAGE SUIT

Band Factory Claims Goshen Man Failed to Carry Out His Part of Contract.

News-Times Special Service: ELKHART, May 12.—L. D. Hall and J. H. State, attorneys for the Martin Band Instrument Co., in its proceedings against George A. Riley of Goshen to rescind a contract, today filed an answer to a cross-complaint recently filed by Mr. Riley. In the cross-complaint, Mr. Riley sued for \$10,000 damages for failure of the instrument company to carry out the proposed exchange of properties as agreed to. The answer alleges that Mr. Riley did not carry out his portion of the agreement and could not give a good title to the 720-acre farm near Muskegon, which entered into the deal, and that other things were not as represented. It also avers, in reply to allegations in the cross-complaint, that the instrument company never gave Mr. Riley possession of the factory for any purpose except to examine the books and that the keys to the post-office box were given to him simply that he might carry the mail to the factory while F. E. Compton, manager of the factory, and who negotiated the proposed trade, was in Michigan inspecting the farm.

SCHOOL TEACHER FOR ALMOST FIFTY YEARS

Constantine Man Has Been Educator Since But a Youth in East.

News-Times Special Service: CONSTANTINE, Mich., May 12.—Of the veteran school teachers of southwestern Michigan none is better known than Theodore Rumbaugh of Constantine, Mich. His life work as a teacher began in 1857 in his native state of Pennsylvania and for 48 years he has devoted himself to teaching, 10 of which were spent in Pennsylvania, five in Illinois and 43 in St. Joe county, Mich.

Mr. Rumbaugh was born in Perry county, Pennsylvania, Jan. 21, 1840. At the age of three his father died and at seven he was bound out to a Scotch-Irish farmer until he was 18. During these years, however, he was given the privileges of a common school education and naturally fond of study, every spare moment found him poring over his books. During the 47 years that St. Joe county has known Mr. Rumbaugh his services have always been in demand, for moderators and directors recognized his unusual ability as an instructor and disciplinarian. He has taught in every township of the county and in every rural school of Constantine township except two. Fourteen of the men and women who studied the three R's with him later sent their children to him.

STREET CAR STRIKE ENDS

Agreement Reached Nine Months After Trouble Started. FORT WAYNE, Ind., May 12.—Officials of the Fort Wayne and Northern Indiana Traction Co., and representatives of the Carmen's union, reached an agreement Thursday night after a six-hour conference, and the strike, which has been on since Sept. 27, 1915, was called off. The company agrees to take back 50 men in two weeks at the old rate of pay, and the rest of the 120 who went out, as rapidly as vacancies occur.
