Claim Moves of Man who Caused War were Known

BERLIN (By wireless to Sayville), May 15.—A statement tending to show that certain activities of the Serbian major, Tankossich, who has been referred to as the man who started the European war, were known to the Serbian government, was given out Sunday by the Overseas News agency. It says to the minister of the interior: "I have the honor to report that yesterday evening three former franc-tireurs, in the name of Maj. Tankossich, visited Swetewik, Sastik, proprietor of the newspaper Balkan. Tankossich desires that in no case shall anything be published in the newspaper regarding the connections or relations of Ciganovic with Belgrade persons and that nothing shall be said which might compromise any Serbian, lest evil consequences result. I have taken measures to ascertain names of the three former franc-tireurs mentioned. (Signed) "Governor of Belgrade." (Name illegible.)
