PLAN ATTACK ON RIGA. Germans Prepare Land and Sea Assault on Russian Port. International News Service: COPENHAGEN, May 16.—Reports that the Germans are planning a combined attack by land and sea against the Russian positions at Riga are partially confirmed by a dispatch from Gothenberg, Sweden, stating that a big German fleet was seen in the Baltic on Sunday. The battleship Hindenburg, one of the largest and newest men of war in the German navy, was said to be a unit in the war fleet. An attempt by German warships to capture a British steamship off Gothenberg was frustrated by English submarines. Four Swedish ships were reported to have been seized by the German men of war and sent into a German port.
