The plaintiff charges that the discharge of McMillen was not the business of the company a great and irreparable injury.

Core makers walkout at Studebaker plant. Negotiate for better sanitary conditions and more pay. Due to the demands of the core-makers at the Studebaker factory, for union recognition, better sanitary conditions, and an increase of pay from 22 to 30 cents per hour, there was a voluntary layoff in that department of the plant Monday morning, pending an adjustment of differences. As to the number that quit work there is a difference of about 100 between the statements given out by the men and the claims of the Studebaker officials. The actual number out is probable 25 or 30. A committee of the workmen has been appointed to confer with the corporation managers.

SUBWAY ORDERED AT NEW CARLISLE CROSSING

A subway for the Lincoln highway crossing at New Carlisle is now assured following the receipt of a telegram from the Indiana state engineer, V. M. Rooker of Indianapolis, to the effect that the Lake Shore railroad and two interurban lines had been ordered to present their specifications and plans to the commission prior to July 1.

IMPORTANT ISSUES ARE IN DEMAND

Railway Stocks Reflect Influence of Cash Buying, Noted For Some Time. International News Service: NEW YORK, May 22.—Nearly all the important issues on the stock exchange at the opening today were in brisk demand. The railway stocks reflected the influence of cash buying, which has been noted for some time. Union Pacific was the most prominent of the group, moving up 1 1/2 to 14 1/2, passing its previous high mark of the year of 14 1/2, made on Jan. 4. Southern Pacific rose 5/8 to 100 3/4. Atchafalpa 5/8 to 105 1/2, and fractional improvements were made in Lehigh Valley, Canadian Pacific, St. Paul, New York Central and Erie-Western Union.
