## WEBER OF PURDUE SIGNED FOR SHORT

### Locals Secure Purdue Captain for Blackmore's Position —Reports June 10.

Mgr. Kelley of the Ball Bands made an announcement Thursday night that should delight followers of the Factory league club. The announcement was that Weber, captain and second baseman on the Purdue varsity baseball team this year, had been secured to fill the vacant position at shortstop caused by the injury to Carl Blackmore.

Weber has departed himself on these fields for several years and his cleaving and fielding abilities are well known to local fans. Weber will not make his appearance here, however, until after the close of the Purdue season. Conference players are not allowed to play outside their own team during the conference season, but are permitted to play the game in non-professional circles during the summer months. His initial appearance will be in the game with the Studebaker club on June 19.

Through the generosity of the Factory league directors, who waived the 90-day rule in this exceptional case, Weber has been secured. "Louie" Wolf, star shortstop on the Notre Dame varsity, was under consideration, but could not make the necessary arrangements. Either man would have been acceptable to the fans as both have played with the local club.

On account of the large crowd from South Bend which will be attracted, the game between the Ball Bands and the Oliver gang will be played at Springbrook park Saturday afternoon instead of at the north side diamonds.
