WISDOM IS ESSENTIAL FOR LIFE'S SUCCESS

Says Rev. D. D. Spangler in Baccalaureate Sermon to Graduating Class.

"Wisdom—The Portion of the Soul," was the subject of the baccalaureate sermon to the graduating class of the high school, delivered at the Methodist Memorial church Sunday night by Rev. D. D. Spangler, pastor of the First Church of the Evangelical association.

Parents and friends of the graduates packed the great edifice, which was banked high with flowers and palms. Pastors of the other churches of the city occupied the platform, all evening services being cancelled, owing to the baccalaureate sermon. The 46 members of the class occupied the front rows of the church seats.

Solor, on a selection of "wisdom" as the only behest he asked of God when given the privilege of choosing anything he would, was dwelt upon by the speaker, who said in part:

"Here is a wonderful man, making a wonderful proposition, that of giving wisdom and understanding to the young man, or youth. When Solomon was permitted by God to choose, he chose Wisdom, and for this reason stands as the man without a second. Solomon assumed that it was entirely possible for the young to be wise. He evidently believed in the possibilities of the youth, making allowance for mistakes and follies, due to inexperience.

Solomon's Proposition.

This proposition of Solomon shows what constitutes the true and only satisfying portion of the soul. Every organ and faculty of man is met by its appropriate correspondent—the eye for light; the ear for sound, and the heart for society.

The negative side may help us to see the positive more clearly. Vanity and frivolity can never satisfy the mind; our minds may for a time be diverted in this way, but they are never fed. How is it with the student who has spent his time on unimportant things? He is disappointed. How is it with the young person who never undertakes anything? A disappointed mind is an unpleasant companion.

"What light is to the eye, sound to the ear, society to the heart, food to the hungry, wisdom is to the soul. It is its light, its music, breath and life-giving portion.

Wisdom Ever Increases.

"The wisdom that satisfies is an ever increasing portion. The wisdom of today is a stepping stone to that of tomorrow; it is like the rising sun that ever increases until it reaches the zenith of its glory. The wisdom of today will not suffice for tomorrow. Never get too smart to listen, perceive and receive. The wise man of today may be a fool tomorrow. If the close of today marks the end of progress. Every ending marks a beginning. Commencement is not an end, but a beginning.

"We get a hint of the vital connection between the inward and the outward; the visible and the invisible. This connection is recognized by God in the constitution he has given to man. We say the body is not the man, but the spirit or mind, thinking and feeling, constitute the man.



Not a whit less of importance is the booking of Dario Resta, the winner of the Chicago speedway contest of last season. Few drivers in the world have achieved more fame in the same length of time. His races have been driven fairly and fearlessly. He has won on account of his skill and the perfect mechanism of his racing car.

The race to be staged at Springbrook on June 4 will be a sporting event by international stars. The mere appearance of two such famed drivers is a matter of real importance. The exhibitions given here by the ill-fated Mickey McGuire two years ago are still remembered. A woman aerialist is always a novelty. But when the grace and youth of Miss Stinson, combined with her unheard-of feats of skill and daring are con-

necture the ego. But God has joined body and soul. This necessary connection is recognized by God in giving to man a perfect revelation of himself in his Son. "God manifest in the flesh," is the highest example of this union.

"This cannot be recognized by Christ in the preparation of His work in the world. It must have a body here; hence the church is the body of Christ. Through this the spiritual Christ comes in contact with the world, as the air with the blood in the lungs.

"This connection brings us to see the nature and purpose of education. Education is not for the individual's sake. You are debtors to all men and they have a right to say what advice you can give in this or that emergency.

Knowledge is Basis.

"The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge. Knowledge is the basis of wisdom; wisdom is knowledge applied to the best end. It follows, then, that wisdom is a development. It has its beginning, as do trees, fruit, grain. The doctrine that wisdom has a beginning is in harmony with reason, and nature—it does not spring forth full grown like Minerva from the brain of Jupiter. This being true, note well what the wise man says: 'The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom.'

"Paul said, 'The love of God constraineth us.' Perfect love casteth out fear. 'We love God because He first loved us.' If fear were sufficient, then the Bible should have concluded with Malachi. The New Testament literature would never have been written. Wisdom would have had its beginning, but no development.

"Nothing is as liberating as the thought of God, without this thought the soul shrinks, withers, with it it expands. Never waste your time over small things or unimportant questions; first of all it is a waste of time; second, it destroys the mind. A great thought has a wonderful expansive power.

Progress Ends in Beauty.

"We are here reminded of a universal and cheering truth, which is beauty. Let us not imagine we can eliminate the beautiful without loss; all true progress is associated with beauty and ends in beauty. With these thoughts in mind, let us read the eighth and ninth verses: 'My son, hear the instruction of thy father, and forsake not the law of thy mother; for they shall be an ornament of grace unto thy head and chains about thy neck.' So may be considered the equivalent of students; your school is to you father and mother.

Right Conduct Admired.

"There is nothing so beautiful as a true, noble life; nothing men love to look upon so much as right actions. Do not think the world wants to see you play the fool. Right conduct is always an ornament of grace and a chain of gold.

"There may be hard, weary marching over rough roads, but you will find many flowers by the way, and the end is the very climax of beauty—the gates of pearl, the streets of gold, the Jasper walls, the tree of life, the ever green fields.

OLD SOLDIERS ATTEND THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Rev. E. K. Van Winkle Preaches Patriotic Sermon—Special Music.

To the number of about 20, the members of the G. A. R. attended the divine services at the First Christian church Sunday forenoon, a large congregation being present. The old soldiers marched from their hall to the church in a body, and on their entrance the Sunday school children arose, gave the chautauqua salute and waved small American flags. The church was appropriately decorated for the occasion.

Mrs. C. E. Tyler and Miss Eulalie Miller contributed vocal solos during the course of the services, while the orchestra played a selection of national airs. In the course of his sermon, Rev. E. K. Van Winkle, pastor of the church, said:

"One more year has witnessed the deaths of the aged soldiers who have been called to answer the roll in those who took part in this just cause. Second, the study of the cause for which they gave their lives and the teaching of these principles to the children who will make up our future generation. Third, the consecration of our citizens to the perpetuation of the cause for which these heroes gave their lives. Fourth, the prophetic vision always involved in the mere service of the larger."

The speaker referred to the martyred war president's speech at Gettysburg, and to the excellent record of the rank and file of the soldiers of both the north and the south. He said the call today is for us to reconsecrate ourselves to make those principles permanent. He hoped to see the day when every flag of every nation is put away, and instead the flag of the cross of Jesus raised.

WIFE BEATER DRAWS LECTURE FROM JUDGE

No Sentence is Too Heavy For Man Who Assaults Spouse.

"A man of your stamp ought to be given at least two years in the penitentiary," Judge Feig told Otis Doolittle when the latter was arraigned before him on a charge of assault and battery filed by his wife, Hattie Doolittle.

Doolittle admitted that he had slapped his wife but said that she was drunk and that she had called him names. Doolittle has been arrested once before in Mishawaka and four or five times in the city court of South Bend. He has contributed little to his wife's support for several years.

In imposing the sentence the judge said that he should give him a heavy term in jail but that his wife would suffer for lack of what little support she did get from her husband. Five dollars fine and \$10 costs were levied against Doolittle and he was turned over to the county jail to lay it out.

419 KILLED BY AIR RAIDS

Herbert Samuel Announces Toll of English Subjects in Commons.

International News Service. LONDON, May 29.—Five hundred and 50 men, women and children have been killed by German air and sea attacks upon England. It was announced in commons today by Home Sec'y Herbert Samuel. There have been three sea raids and 23 air attacks. In the sea raids 61 men, 46 women and 49 children were killed and 611 were injured. In the air raids 232 men, 114 women and 73 children were killed and 1,005 wounded.
