

ANNUAL TRIBUTE TO "BOYS OF '61"

Memorial Day Parade is One of Best in Years, Many Orders Participating.

With ranks thinned by the onward march of time, their line of yesterday naught but a mere shadow of the once-full column, survivors of the war of the rebellion made their 45th annual pilgrimage to the city cemetery yesterday afternoon to pay tribute to their departed comrades. Inspired by the strains of martial music, but strengthened by their purpose to honor the graves of those who have preceded them, the remaining heroes of the great struggle, who gloried only in war that they might save their country from disruption, fearlessly braved the long march. So few were their number that, in the eyes of the high school that, in the pretty custom each year is observed when the old soldiers and Spanish war veterans exchange flags with the school children for bouquets of flowers, the children far exceeded the veterans. Each old soldier carried two and even three bunches of flowers, while not one of the members of the company, attention was disappointed in not receiving the patriotic trophy. The flags were given to all.

Big Crowds Line Streets.
All along the line of march, shortened as much as possible to save the patriots from unnecessary fatigue, the surging crowds on the sidewalk greeted the paraders with enthusiastic handclapping. Applause greeted the Notre Dame cadets, whose imposing march made a pretty picture, and there was more applause when the small band of national guard and the detachment of Boy Scouts put in an appearance. But as the rear of the procession moved forward and the grey-haired survivors of the big war approached, there was a wave of expression from the enthusiastic bystanders, alternately applauding and again standing in mute silence in sympathetic understanding as the old soldiers made their weary way to the graves of their old comrades.

Police in Lead.
It was an inspiring sight as the parade swung up Colfax av. from Washington. The police, headed by Capt. James Shock, led the parade, closely followed by the officer of the day with his aide. Then came the Notre Dame university cadets, with their dapper uniforms and gleaming guns. Following were the members of Co. F and Washington camp, No. 6675, M. W. A. After that came McKinley camp, No. 58, Sons of Veterans, and the Harry O. Perkins camp of United Spanish War Veterans. Following these were the members of the two Grand Army of the Republic posts, Auten post, No. 8, and Norman Eddy post, No. 579, Speakers' carriages and the city officers brought up the rear.

Many Ride in Parade.
Some of the members of the post, too feeble to attempt the long march, went to the cemetery in automobiles and carriages. Many local patriotic citizens lent a helping hand by providing transportation. Everywhere in the business district American flags were flying, while on Colfax av. there were only a few residences that did not display the national emblem.

The day was perfect with a cloudless sky and a not unkindly sun, tempered by a light north wind. Once at the cemetery, the old soldiers broke ranks to place the flowers given them by the city's school children upon the graves. After that the assembly call brought them to the speaker's stand, where the formal program of the day was opened. The Notre Dame cadets returned early in the afternoon, due to the necessity of them reaching the school grounds, but the other military organizations and old soldiers did not make the return trip until after the program had closed.

Sailor Dead Honored.
In honor of the sailors who gave up their lives for the union, three boats made of flowers were set afloat on the river at Howard park in the morning. As the little floral ships floated on the water, the Sons of Veterans and Co. F, I. N. G., fired a salute. Flowers were also strewn on the water to pay tribute to the memory of the dead sailors.

The exercises at the park were in charge of the Norman Eddy Wagon's Relief corps. A prayer was said by Rev. George W. Allison, pastor of Hope Presbyterian chapel and a reading was given by Miss Essie Hogue. Duets were sung by Miss Dora Zeas and Mrs. George Gall and Mrs. Essie Thornton and Miss Maude Alexander. The singing was led by William Goebel. Representatives of the G. A. R. posts, the Wagon's Relief corps, the Spanish War veterans, the Sons of Veterans, Co. F, and the Army and Navy union attended the services.

At the soldiers' and sailors' monument on the court house yard, the unknown soldiers who died on the battlefields of the south were honored. Children from the Sample st. portable school threw bouquets of flowers on the steps of the monument. The children sang "The Star Spangled Banner" and recited the pledge of "one country, one language and one flag" that is taken by school children in the local public schools. William Rowe, captain of Auten post, G. A. R., said the prayer. The services at the monument were in charge of the relief corps of Auten post.

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

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
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Wed at 4 A.M. to Escape Before Classmates Know

Persons standing on the awning which was suspended by chains over the sidewalk, crowded near the edge and under the increased weight the structure fell, taking with it a ton of bricks torn from the wall behind, on to the crowd on the sidewalk.
