AT THE AUDITORIUM.

That sterling actor, William Farnum, is appearing at the Auditorium today in a six-part Fox production entitled, "The Battle of Hearts," a powerful drama of seacoast life. "Dumb Heiress," a Sis Hopkins comedy, and the regular release of the Selig-Tribune weekly of current news are also on the bill. Billie Burke, famous star of the speaking stage and proclaimed by many America's most charming actress, will be seen tomorrow in the first chapter of her new serial picture, "Gloria's Romance," written by Mr. and Mrs. Rupert Hughes. Judge Freeman and his daughter, Lois, friends of the Staffords, also arrive at Palm Beach. Freeman is attended by Dr. Royce, who becomes interested in Gloria. One night, Gloria, eluding her governess, goes for a long spin along the beach in her brother's new racing car, loses control of the auto and finds the machine dashing straight for the ocean. She succeeds in getting safely out of the motor, but loses her way when she attempts to return home afoot, and down finds her wandering in the everglades. She is able to borrow a boy's suit of clothes when her own gown is torn to shreds and, thus dressed, is found by a band of Seminole Indians. Frenau, seeking her, notes that Dr. Royce has arrived ahead of him, but while Royce is engaged in a hand-to-hand combat with a young Indian, Frenau bears Gloria to her father and is hailed as her rescuer. Upon the return of the Staffords to New York, Frenau continues his attentions to Gloria, resulting in their engagement. Later Frenau mysteriously disappears, and Gloria becomes suspicious. How she eventually succeeds in solving the riddle holds one spellbound to the very end of "Gloria's Romance," which requires 20 feature chapters for the telling.

But Billie Burke is not the only attraction for tomorrow, for none other than those two popular players, Francis Bushman and Beverly Bayne will appear in a five-act Metro production, "A Million a Minute," a story of mystery, romance, adventure and intrigue, with scenes laid in two continents.

AT THE ORPHEUM.

FLED TO ESCAPE ARREST AS SPY, SAYS LYMAN

Conducts Own Case on Charge of Using Mails to Defraud—Nine Jurors Chosen.

NEW YORK, May 31.—The belief that he was suspected of being a German spy and munition ship destroyer caused Dr. John Grant Lyman hurriedly to close up the brokerage business he was operating under the name of J. H. Putnam & Co. in this city and flee to Florida, he asserted Monday at the opening of his trial in the United States district court on the charge of using the mails to defraud. The indictments charge that Dr. Lyman, operating under the name of J. H. Putnam & Co., used the mails to defraud investors who purchased oil and munition stocks on the installment plan. Lyman, who also is wanted by the federal authorities of Los Angeles for fleeing from that city while under \$20,000 bail, after being convicted for operating a Panama land swindling scheme, dismissed his lawyers and acted as his own attorney.

Dr. Lyman indicated his defense during the examination of witnesses when he asked who their sympathies were with in the present war. After nine jurors had been chosen, Lyman told the court he was so fatigued that he was unable to continue, and adjournment was taken until Wednesday.

PREPAREDNESS COINS COMING

Sec'y McAdoo Announces New Money Soon to be Put in Circulation.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Preparedness coins, the first ever struck, will go into circulation in the United States shortly after July next. Sec'y of the Treasury McAdoo Tuesday announced the forthcoming advent of the new coins, stating that they are intended to typify in a measure the "awakening interest of the country in its own protection." The new preparedness coins will be 25-cent pieces and will appear with newly designed coins of the 10-cent and half dollar denominations. These new designs for fractional silver are to be adopted in accordance with the law which permits such alterations every quarter of a century. Twenty-five years have elapsed since the last change, Attitude of Defense.

The preparedness quarter will show on the obverse side a figure of "liberty," stepping forward to the gateway of the country, with left arm upraised in defense and on the right a shield. The whole attitude is one of defense. In the right hand is an olive branch and the words "liberty" and "in God we trust," and the date, "1916." On the reverse side is an American eagle in full flight.

The new half dollar will show a full length liberty bearing the American flag and carrying laurel and oak branches on one side and an eagle, perched on a crag with spread wings on the other. A mountain pine sapling, growing from the rock also is on the reverse side. The inscription "in God we trust" also appears. The design shows a new profile of liberty on the obverse and on the reverse a fasces or bundle of rods fastened together symbol of the strength that lies in unity. Olive branches surround the fasces.

Half Dollar and Dime.
The new half dollar and dime were designed by Adolph A. Weinman, a pupil of St. Gaudens, and the designer of the facade of the Union Soldiers' and Sailors' monument in Baltimore and other works. The preparedness quarter was designed by Herman E. McNeil, the sculptor of the McKinley memorial at Columbus, Ohio.

The new coins will be struck under the direction of Robert W. Woolley, director of the mint. Before the designs were adopted they were submitted to the Fine Arts commission which ratified them. The accepted designs were chosen from more than 50 models submitted by

several sculptors commissioned by Sec'y McAdoo to submit suggestions. The changing of both sides of the coins is an innovation, it having been the custom heretofore to alter but one side. Sec'y McAdoo said Tuesday that he hopes the new design on the half dollar will popularize that coin as it has been gradually going out of use during recent years.

INDIAN DIES ON TRAIN

Body of Chief Iron Tail Found in Chicago Depot.

CHICAGO, May 31.—Chief Iron Tail, 65 years old, whose home is on an Indian reservation near Rushville, Neb., died on a passenger train near Fort Wayne, Ind., Monday, but his death did not become known until the train reached Chicago. Chief Iron Tail, who for many years traveled with western shows, was on his way home with his wife. He was taken ill while with a show at Washington, D. C. He is believed to have died of pneumonia.


