

# Hill Fails to Stop Grand Rapids and Benders Lose Contest by 9 to 3 Count

## GET FIFTEEN HITS GOOD FOR 29 BASES

### Doubles, Triples and Home Runs Are Common Affairs—Donnelly Gets One.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., June 4.—Grand Rapids won its third straight victory from South Bend Sunday by getting to Hill for 15 safeties, which were good for a total of 29 bases. The final score was 9 to 3.

Donnelly's rasping home run in the first inning, coming after Grimes had been hit by a pitched ball, gave the Benders two runs in the first inning and a lead which looked good until the third, when Haggerty lined another one over the fence, putting Grand Rapids on even terms with Smith's men. Before the inning had been completed, the Sox had taken a one-run lead on Brant's single and Edgington's double.

Haggerty hit and. Although Haggerty was touched for eight hits and three of Benders got in front of pitched balls while the same number were given bases on balls, the Sox hurler worked effectively until his mates had piled up a safe lead for him. Three runs more were added to the Sox total in the fifth inning on Carey's triple, Alcock's single, Brant's fielder's choice and Edgington's drive over the left field fence.

South Bend scored its third and final run in the sixth on Hensling's double and Hill's single. McArthur's single and Haggerty's double gave the Sox another run in their half of this inning. Brant's double, Wright's triple and Edgington's single accounted for the final two local tallies in the seventh. South Bend had 11 men left on bases, three being stranded in the second, when Wright left his feet to catch Koehler's drive to the fence. Force plays killed what scoring chances the Benders had in the third, fourth and fifth innings, where Tannehill, Reall and Donnelly got singles. Hensling was anared in a double play in the eighth, after he had singled when Zeiser hit to Haggerty.

Fill Bases in Ninth. The Benders filled the bases in the ninth when Haggerty passed a fashang and hit Koehler, but a force play killed the last chances of Smith's men to score. Opregelt has been released by Mgr. Koehler. Bowman and Meltzer are announced as the pitchers for Monday's game.

## LOCALS HAVE 101 CHANCES TO WIN

There is a chance of the locals coming back home at the 500 mark, but in order to do this they must take all the five remaining games. They have won 12 and lost 19. They need four straights to put them at the 500 mark, but one defeat would send them back. It must be either five straights or four straights and a postponed game.

The next 13 games are going to have much to say with the final standing of the teams in the league. If the local club can get up to the 500 mark it will be in a position to make a bid for high honors, since it will still have at least 12 games to play with every club in the league and will more than have a chance to get the edge in every series.

## DAYTON HAS IT ON LOCALS.

Dayton is the one club that has it on the local bunch. These teams have met in seven contests and the locals have won only one. Grand Rapids has the jump on the locals, but there are five more games to play and the locals have a chance to even or better the count. Muskegon is yet to be met.

Facts and figures are always interesting insofar as baseball is concerned. Right now all the figuring is on Dayton. That bunch has one big lead and looks like an easy winner of the bunting, but in all the games staged between the Benders and the Vets the locals gave them a run for their money. The Vets managed to get most of the breaks and they won.

But these six victories over the local club puts the Vets up in the lead. Had they gone otherwise the Vets would have won 21 and lost 13, instead of winning 27 and losing only seven. Then the race would be entirely different and the locals would be 3 above the 300 mark instead of below it.

Breaks are bound to come and it would not be surprising to see the locals hand it to the Vets the next time these clubs meet. The locals have battled them in every game and the season now is not a fourth zone, and stranger things have happened in baseball.
