## ONLY 3 HOOSIERS GET SAFE BLOWS

### Bashang Leads With Three, While Donnelly and Koehler Get Others.

**GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., June 6.**—So the Bend could not bunt hits on Steve Meltzer Monday and Grand Rapids won its fourth straight victory, making a clean sweep of the series. The score was 3 to 0. Bashang, Donnelly and Koehler were the only Benders with hits, the former getting three safeties, while the other visitors finding Meltzer's offerings equally divided four singles. Not one of the blows secured off the Sox hurler were good for more than one base and he did not allow a man. Meltzer's offerings seemed rather easy for the visitors at the start but after the fourth he tightened up and allowed only two safeties for the rest of the route. Bashang singled in the first, but was forced at second by Blannie, who played his first game at short stop Monday for the Benders. Devormer's peg headed off Blannie who tried to steal second.

**More Hits Wasted.**  
 Donnelly beat out a hit to short in the second, but was forced by Tannehill after Koehler had skied out. Bashang got his second single in the third, the blow coming after two men were down, although the Bender centerfielder stole second. He was left there when Blannie fled to Kingston. Donnelly and Koehler got singles in the fourth with one down, the first named getting to third, while Koehler reached second, but Brant threw Tannehill out at first and Meltzer fanned Grimes for the third out. The Benders went hitless in the next three innings, but threatened in the eighth. Brant booted Beall's grounder for a start. Bowman forced Beall, but Bashang cracked out his third hit, a single to left. Trouble was avoided, however, when McArthur and Alcock took care of Blante and Hensling.

**Three Reach First in Ninth.**  
 Three Benders reached first in the ninth. Donnelly was safe on Weinburg's error. Koehler singled. Tannehill popped out to Devormer and Grimes forced Koehler while Weinburg caught Beall's infield fly for the final out.

Alcock's double and Brant's single were good for one Sox tally in the opening round. A pass to McArthur, followed by singles by Devormer and Carey, brought another in the second. Devormer's double and Carey's single accounted for the third Sox run in the seventh.



There were a couple of gentlemen Ed wanted. You know the boys of them. One is out in the Western league and the other is in the Southern league, but it appears neither is for sale. The one in the Southern league is going to be kept by New Orleans. He is going to be used as an pinch hitter and a pitcher. Didn't you know Jimmy was a pitcher? Why yes he hurled the first year he was out. And Jimmy is a fair hurler.

**Smith Still Hunting.**

Ed is not a quitter and will have a team before he gets through, but it must be admitted that corraling a bunch of players in the Central is a harder job and costs more than doing the same stunt in the Southern Michigan.

Dayton opens at Evansville this afternoon. This is the first time those clubs have met. The Evans have taken on a couple of new men since they played here and are likely to make things interesting for the Vets. Should the Vet hurling staff take a slip, things might be different in this league. The chances are that the Vet hurlers will and if they do Nee's gang is due for a drop.

The election of a track captain will probably take place some time this week. The pilot for next year's varsity baseball team will be chosen just before the alumni game on commencement day.


