

ASKS RALSTON TO BE RETIRED

Col. Conde of Second Regiment Pleads Age Limit and Poor Health.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 21.—Col. Henri T. Conde, commander of the second regiment of infantry of the Indiana national guard, sent a letter to Gov. Ralston Tuesday asking that he be retired under the military law.

The governor has not taken any action on Col. Conde's request, but it is believed the veteran will be retired. He entered the service in 1877, enlisting as a private in Company A, second regiment. He served through the Spanish-American war and gradually rose to his present command.

In his letter asking that he be retired, Col. Conde states that his action is taken with regret, but that his age and the condition of his health makes it necessary. When seen at his home Tuesday night, he said he had nothing to add to the statement contained in the letter to the governor.

NAVAL BUILDING PLAN AGREED TO BY WILSON

White House Conference Ends With Program of at Least Four Cruisers; Two Dreadnaughts.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—A building program of at least four battle cruisers and two dreadnaughts and an increase of 20,700 men in the navy's enlisted personnel were agreed on at a white house conference Tuesday as provisions which the administration will ask the senate to include in the pending naval bill.

Sec'y Daniels, Chairman Tillman of the senate naval committee, and Sen. Swanson, another majority committee member, went over the building and personnel provisions carefully with President Wilson and it was said afterward the work would be started immediately to write into the bill the increases agreed on. The senate committee appointed Sens. Tillman, Swanson and Lodge to draft the necessary amendments.

Guard Panama Canal Locks

PANAMA, June 21.—The locks of the Panama canal are being guarded with increased vigilance, as a result of the Mexican situation.

N. Y. RED CROSS READY

NEW YORK, June 21.—At a meeting here Tuesday of the United States military relief commission of the New York Red Cross arrangements were completed for the immediate dispatch, when needed, of four Red Cross hospital units for the Mexican border.

The physicians in charge of the units reported that if the financial support is forthcoming there are sufficient volunteers to establish at least two more units. Those already organized have a capacity of 2,000 hospital beds.

Hold German Banker at El Paso, Texas


EL PASO, Texas, June 21.—Frederick Griese, a German banker of Mexico City, was under detention by agents of the department of justice here Tuesday charged with violation of the United States neutrality laws. Griese was prevented Monday night from crossing into Mexico.

Agents of the department of justice are maintaining secrecy regarding the exact allegations against Griese pending investigation. It is said, however, that his detention is an outcome of various reports regarding the spreading of anti-American propaganda in Mexico. He spent last night in jail, but was released today. Meantime Washington has been notified.

DETAILS OF PROBE ARE UNKNOWN IN WASHINGTON. WASHINGTON, June 21.—Although Frederick Griese, the Mexico City banker arrested in El Paso, has been under surveillance of department of justice agents for several weeks, details of the investigation have been left to the departments agents on the border and are unknown to officials here. It was said Tuesday night that a full report was expected Wednesday and that only the fact of Griese's arrest had been reported thus far.
