An informal reception was tendered the playground supervisors last night by the members of the municipal recreation committee at the office of Municipal Recreation Director F. B. Barnes. The reception followed a business meeting of the recreation committee.

Discussion of the methods to be employed this summer upon the recreation fields, led by Louis Hammerschmidt, chairman of the committee, was made by the members of the committee and the playground directors. Mr. Hammerschmidt spoke of the results being obtained through organized play, and the effects upon the children. He said that the systemized plan of recreation reached the child through character moulding, making him a better citizen.
