## COMPANY IS ORGANIZED; 89 MEN NOW ON ROLL

### Hubert Nifong is Elected Captain of First Volunteer Organization.

Mishawaka's volunteer company of soldiers is now established. At a meeting of 200 citizens and more than 50 signers of the first roll, at the Century theater Thursday night, the organization was completed.

Hubert Nifong, suggester of the company, was unanimously elected captain of the new organization. Carl Peterson was elected first lieutenant and William Peers second lieutenant. Capt. Nifong made his first appointment of non-commissioned officers, and named Walter Phelan first sergeant. These four men will proceed to schedule drill nights and attend to all business of the company until the final organization is made.

Roll Up to 89. Twenty new men signified their intention of joining the company and signed the muster roll. With the 69 names secured Tuesday night the total number of signers has now reached 89. Although not all were present Thursday night they will probably turn out for the first drill which will be held the latter part of next week.

Enthusiasm is high. Enthusiasm ran high at the meeting, every patriotic utterance of the many speakers being greeted with applause, while everyone rose and sang "America" as a finale. Preceding the meeting the women company band played patriotic airs in front of the theater and again in the lobby they entertained with national tunes. When Manager George Senner of the Century draped the speakers' table with a large American flag, the crowd roared its approval.

Hon. E. A. Jernegan presided at the meeting and guided it through the preliminary stages of organization. In a short speech Mr. Jernegan said that Mishawaka's patriotic spirit was causing much favorable comment. He issued a call for signers and 14 men came forward and signified their willingness to join the company.

When the call for election of officers came, William Peers moved that Hubert Nifong be unanimously elected captain and the motion went through with a cheer. Peers and Peterson ran against each other for first lieutenant with Peterson having the edge on the balloting. Peers then moved that the election be made unanimous and it was passed. Frank Varney moved that Peers be elected second lieutenant by acclamation and that was carried.

## TWO NEW CEMETERIES NOW BEFORE COUNCIL

### Second Proposition Makes its Appearance at Councilmanic Committee Meeting.

Two new cemeteries are now being considered by the committee on public improvements of the council. Charles W. Bingham presented a petition asking permission for the establishment of a cemetery on the Stocking farm, directly north of the present cemetery. He explained features of it and urged the council to take favorable action on it.

Judge Ralph Feig talked to the committee on the Borley cemetery proposition. He explained that property had already been purchased and everything was ready for permission from the council. Dr. W. E. Borley also addressed the members of the committee. The committee asked that a schedule of the prices of lots in the proposed cemeteries be furnished them before they took action on the matter.

Promoters of the Borley plot argued that they had already secured grounds for the cemetery, while the Stocking people admitted that they merely had an option on their property and had taken no steps in the matter waiting for permission from the council. The Borley cemetery was due for passage by the council at its meeting nearly two weeks ago, but Mayor Gaylor objected on the grounds that more propositions should be heard.

Harry E. Strubbe, Spanish-American war veteran, made a stirring speech in which he told the men that they would never realize what the Stars and Stripes stood for until they had served it. He said that in order to be good citizens we must be lovers of the flag and that military work was the best developer. Strubbe was formerly commander of a company of cadets of the First Presbyterian church, five members of which were now non-commissioned officers in national guards.

E. S. Utery, an ex-regimental army man, Guy Alvord, H. E. Sketeeve, Arthur Whitaker and many other members of the company, made short speeches. Capt. Nifong announced at the close of the meeting that he had applied to Lieut. Gen. Bridges, in command of the United States army in Indiana, that Mishawaka had a company of volunteers ready for service and only waited for a call. The announcement was greeted with a round of cheers.

MANY ATTEND SOCIAL. A large number of people attended the "Something New" social held in the oak grove at the corner of Calhoun and Joseph sts. Thursday evening. Selections by a quartet composed of Eugene Ganser, George and Leonard Chamberlain and Joseph Fetters was one of the features.
