MYSTERY SURROUNDS DEATH OF JOHN LAMB

Suicide Is Verdict of Coroner, Second One in Same House Within Ten Days.

Mystery shrouds the death of John Lamb, 39 years old, a night worker at the Woolen company, who according to the verdict of Coroner T. J. Swantz, committed suicide by taking gas. Lamb was found lying across his bed dead, about five o'clock yesterday afternoon, at his boarding house, 113 E. First st.

Lamb returned from his work about five o'clock Monday morning, as usual and went upstairs to bed, and in turning out the gas, it is thought, he left the jet partly open. This is given as one of the reasons of his death, as he might have inhaled the fumes during his sleep. The window was open, and as far

as is known, Lamb made no preparations for such a deed. In all probabilities death was accidental. Inhaling the gas and possibly a weak heart hastened his end. When found he was lying with his legs upon the bed and his head hanging to the floor. Across his chest there was a black and blue mark about 15 inches long. It is thought that in his convulsions he in some way sustained the mark.

Very little is known of the man. He came to the boarding house August 15, and stayed about a week when he left. Monday noon he returned and retired for several hours. Getting up at three o'clock he told Mrs. Roy Gelbaugh, his landlady, that he was going to work. This was the last she saw of him, until she viewed his dead body. Lamb came in Monday morning about five o'clock and went directly to his room. As was his custom he usually arose at two o'clock and loafed about the house until time for work. When he did not come down, Mrs. Gelbaugh became worried and asked another roomer, Games Chisholm, to go upstairs and see what was the matter. When Chisholm opened the door and saw Lamb lying across the bed, he cried for Mrs. Gelbaugh to come upstairs. Upon seeing the body, she ran to the police station, and asked for someone to investigate. Detective John Weaver hurried to the house and after an investigation sent the body to the Finch & Sprague morgue. He had probably been dead several hours. It was learned that he had lived for over 12 years in the local orphan home. He had been working at the Woolen company for several weeks. He was practically penniless, his wages being drawn in advance for board. No funeral arrangements have as yet been made.


