

WILSON AIDS IN BORDER PROBLEM

Makes Personal Call on Mexican Commission and Offers Suggestions.

NEW LONDON, Conn., Sept. 13.—Pres't Wilson Tuesday lent his personal aid to the American-Mexican joint commission in seeking a permanent foundation of sympathy and understanding upon which may rest the future relations of the United States and Mexico. Putting aside for one hour his own cares and his vigil at the bedside of his sister, who is ailing here, Mr. Wilson exchanged calls with Gen. Carranza's representatives. It was the first time during his administration that the executive had dealt personally with a representative of the Mexican de facto government and the significance of this fact was not lost upon either the American or Mexican commissioners.

The regeneration of the stricken nation must come from within, Mr. Wilson said, and in answer for his colleagues and himself, Luis Cabrera, Carranza's minister of finance chairman of the Mexican delegation asserted that his country was struggling toward the light of free and democratic government.

Mr. Wilson laid great stress, it was learned, on the point upon which both Sec'y Lansing and Sec'y Lane centered their remarks at the first meeting of the commission in New York—the protection of American lives and property in Mexico.

The president said he hoped that the commission would be successful in finding a solution for its problems which would insure the security of Americans not only along the border, but in any part of Mexico.

During the convention Mr. Wilson indicated his comprehension of the great problems, political, economic and social, which Mexico is facing. It was in this connection, he

said, that regeneration must come from within and that development must be parallel in all three lines. **Must Look To U. S. As Tutor.** Mr. Cabrera, in his reply, referred to the United States as leader of the movement for free government and as the tutor to whom Mexico must look in striving for the type of government its people sought. Much had been done, he said, but much also remained to be accomplished before the aims of the revolution could be achieved.

A formal statement, issued by the commission, said Mr. Cabrera had presented a review of political developments in Mexico to show that civil government was being substituted for military rule in territory controlled by the de facto government. "Mr. Cabrera further outlined," the statement continued, "the plan which Gen. Carranza has in mind for the speedy civil re-organization of the country. He is of the opinion that certain basic social and economic reforms should be carried through as preliminary to the revision of the present constitution. As soon as conditions permit a constitutional convention will be called for this purpose.

To Provide For Elections. "Immediately after the revision of the constitution has been effected, provisions will be made for elections within the several states of the union and this will be followed by the presidential elections.

BLEASE DEFEAT SEEN IN EARLY RETURNS

COLUMBIA, S. C., Sept. 13.—Nearly complete returns late Tuesday night from South Carolina's "run off" democratic primary indicated that Gov. Richard L. Manning was renominated over former Gov. Cole L. Blease by a majority estimated at between three thousand and seven thousand votes. With about 129,000 votes reported out of a registration of 150,000 Manning had 67,467 and Blease 62,399.

Late returns show that James Candler was nominated for railroad commissioner over Albert Fant by 20,000 majority. Representative Wyatt Alkton of the third congressional district, seemed to have been defeated by F. H. Dominick in a close race.

MAINE VOTE IS WILSON VICTORY

Will Carry Nation if Same Rate is Maintained in Other States.

News-Times Special Service: NEW YORK, N. Y., Sept. 13.—That the democrat candidates in Maine polled a percentage of the progressive, independent and stay at home vote of former years adequate to enable Woodrow Wilson to carry the country by a large majority, if the same percentage is maintained in other states, is conclusively shown by the final returns from Maine.

It is also true that the democratic candidates for senator in Maine, the vote for whom undoubtedly was cast upon national issues solely, scored an increase over the vote for president Wilson in Maine, which if maintained at the same rate throughout the country, would give President Wilson a majority of the popular vote of the country and assure his safe re-election in November.

Johnston and Sills, the two democratic candidates for United States senators, according to the unofficial returns polled respectively 17,160 and 15,719 more votes than Woodrow Wilson polled in Maine in 1912. In 1912 Wilson got 51,113 votes in Maine.

Taft got 26,545 votes and Roosevelt got 48,493 votes. This represents a total of 126,151 votes cast for the candidates of the three principal parties.

In 1916 for senator Johnson polled 68,273 votes; and Sills polled 66,822 votes as against 78,044 for Hale and 79,368 for Fernald. Johnson's gain over Wilson was thirty-three per cent and Sills' gain was about thirty-one per cent. This shows the tremendous addition to the normal democratic vote in Maine, due to the strength of Woodrow Wilson's case before the people.

See 400,000 for Wilson. Fernald polled the highest vote of all the republican candidates in Maine and his total, 79,368, represents a gain of 4,330 over the Taft-Roosevelt vote combined in 1912, about six per cent. A gain of thirty-one per cent for Wilson carried throughout the nation upon the basis of the 1912 total popular vote would give him a plurality of over 200,000 over the total nation-wide Taft-Roosevelt vote, plus a six per cent increase. The Johnson gain of thirty-three per cent would give Wilson nearly 400,000 popular plurality.

The vote in Maine was an abnormal one and the assumption that the republican ticket in the nation at large will poll six per cent more than the Taft-Roosevelt total of 1912 is absurd, but even on this basis Wilson would win. Elsewhere the large percentage of the progressive vote certain to be cast for Wilson will add to the democratic vote proportionately and cut the republican total far below the combined aggregate of the Roosevelt and Taft vote of 1912.

CLARK AND MARSHALL OPEN IN MISSOURI

Defend Wilson Administration and Attack Hughes for His Criticisms of Work.

JOPLIN, Mo., Sept. 13.—Vice Pres't Marshall, Sen. James A. Reed and Speaker Champ Clark, were the principal speakers at the opening of the democratic campaign here Tuesday. Mr. Marshall spoke in the afternoon and Speaker Clark and Mr. Reed at night.

Faces Heavy Schedule on Three Day Trip to be Made Through Indiana.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 13.—When Charles T. Hughes, republican nominee for president enters Indiana on Sept. 21 for a three day campaign, he will face a schedule of 33 speeches, only seven of which however, will be of the extended variety. At least this is the present plan, according to reports received here from republican county chairmen of counties through which the Hughes special will pass indicating that he is to speak at various points within their respective jurisdiction.
