SERBIANS ROUT BULGARIANS ON 9 MILE FRONT

Sweeping Victory For Allied Troops in Macedonia is Reported by Paris War Office.

IN HOT PURSUIT OF THE DEFEATED ARMY

International News Service: PARIS, Sept. 15.—Allied French, Serbian and British troops have won a sweeping victory over the Bulgarians...

The entire right wing of the Bulgarian army west of Lake Ostrovo appears to have been crumpled up by the smashing attack of the reorganized Serbian army.

On the Vardar front the British found themselves opposed by combined Bulgarian and German forces, but these were unable to check the attacks of the British.

While their Serbian and English allies were driving forward successfully the French also took the offensive and launched an attack upon Bulgarian trenches on a front of nearly a mile.

REPORT VICTORY. SALONIKI, Sept. 15.—Serbian troops have taken from the Bulgarians positions at Malkandje and the Bulgarians are in full retreat toward Florina.

ATTACK FAILS. BERLIN, Sept. 15.—The German war office announced today that English troops had made another attempt to capture the German salient line at Thiepval, on the Somme front, but failed.

ALLIES GAIN ON WESTERN FRONT

Thousand Yards of Strongest Fortified Line Taken by British.

By Frederick Palmer. WITH THE BRITISH ARMIES IN FRANCE, Sept. 15.—Flers has been captured by the British troops.

Flers is less than four miles south of Bapaume on the road between that important German base and Guinchy.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—Once more the British have pierced the German front at one of the points boasted by the Teuton commanders to be the strongest.

To the north of the road leading from Bapaume to Albert, the British also smashed the Teuton line advancing from 2,000 to 3,000 yards in a front of six miles.

EXTEND LINES. MURDERER TRIES TO ESCAPE; SHOT. NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—Arthur Watson, confessed murderer of Mrs. Elizabeth Nichols, a wealthy widow here a year ago, attempted to escape from detectives who were bringing him back to New York from Ironwood, Mich., when the New York Central train stopped at Montrose, Watson, who was accompanied by Detectives Enright and Foley, leaped to his feet and rushed to the station platform.

GERMAN SUB IS DUE? Tug Boat Said to Have Left Boston to Act as Convoy.

MARKET IN HANDS OF MILK TRUSTS

Monopolies Established in All the Large Cities, According to Complaints.

International News Service: WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—The milk distribution business in most large cities in the United States is in the hands of monopolies, according to evidence in the hands of investigators of the department of agriculture, and the department of justice is planning to join in the nationwide investigation with a view of filing anti-trust suits against the milk trusts, it was announced here today.

Complaints of milk monopolies are pouring in to the department of justice from all parts of the country. Also it is charged monopolies are being established in dairying communities in various rural districts and by freeing out other dealers to constitute the sole market for the farmers' milk which will sour if not speedily delivered.

Among the products embargoed are meats, foodstuffs and oils.

New Embargo is Placed on North European Nations

International News Service: WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—A new embargo on trade with northern European countries has been imposed by the British war trade department, Consul Gen. Skinner at London reported to the department of commerce today.

The restrictions, he said, "have been agreed to by the allies and apply to shipments from the United States. The articles mentioned are those which have been supplied to the countries concerned in quantities alleged to exceed the normal requirements of such countries."

Among the products embargoed are metals, foodstuffs and oils.

SMUGGLERS ARRESTED

Goods valued at an immense sum are said to have reached Germany before the conspiracy was nipped. Allied agents had for a long time suspected the existence of the smuggling system, and had conducted an investigation independently of the Danish authorities.

SPEED OF STEAMER SAVES PASSENGERS

Vessel Congress With Hold on Fire Races to Land and Safety.

International News Service: MAKSHFIELD, Ore., Sept. 15.—The gaunt skeleton of the steamer Congress, protruding from the sands off the entrance to Coos bay, was all that remained today to remind the 252 passengers and 170 crew that had narrowly escaped another Volturno disaster.

The passengers landed here were none the worse for wear today, and many of them scattered for their destinations. They have the speed of the Congress to thank for their escape, according to the vessel's officers.

With a dangerous fire raging below decks, Capt. Cousins turned the nose of the Congress toward shore, 50 miles away, and began a race with death. Two miles from shore the fire became so bad that he was forced to halt and the passengers and crew were transferred to the bar-dredge Capt. Michie, without accident.

Highest praise was given the ship's officers and crew today by thankful passengers. Several times during that thrilling dash for the land a panic was imminent, but the coolness and courage of the crew each time averted it.

WHITE SLAVER GUILTY
