WHITE GIRL'S PHOTO IN NEGRO'S LOCKET

Man Says Woman Stopped Him in Philadelphia and Gave Him Picture.

News-Times Special Service: FORT WAYNE, Ind., Sept. 18.—How a negro man secured a photograph of a white woman which he carries in a locket he wears on a watchless watch-chain puzzled the police after a negro giving his name as James Williams, was arrested on complaint of Arthur Schneider, 1223 Wall st., that the darky had stolen his watch.

The white woman's picture was not discovered until after his arrest. He said it was a picture of "Jennie," a woman who met him on Lombard st. in Philadelphia, and gave it to him. At first he claimed it was that of a negro woman, but later admitted she was white. He said he did not know the woman's last name, or why she gave him the picture.

It was contained in a locket engraved C. B. S., which he said his wife found and gave to him. In a money-less pocketbook, was found a pawn ticket for a revolver "put up" in the name of Gus Wilson.

These facts and conflicting statements made by the negro will cause the police today to begin a close investigation into the negro's past.

The negro was arrested by Patrolman Godfrey near the corner of Clinton and Barr sts. while being chased by a white man. When Schneider, who says he is a cigarmaker, came panting to the scene, he claimed the negro had met him at Clinton and Holman sts. and walked with him to Lafayette and Holman sts. where he asked the time. When Schneider pulled out his watch, according to his statement, the negro grabbed it and ran. Schneider's watch chain bore no sign of being broken, but he said the ball on the watch had slipped off. No watch was found on the negro.

LEGISLATURE MAY PASS CITY PLANNING MEASURE

Fort Wayne Man, Chairman of Drafting Committee, Will Ask Support For Bill.

News-Times Special Service: FORT WAYNE, Ind., Sept. 18.—A city planning bill probably will be passed by the state legislature of Indiana at the coming session, according to plans which are now under way. Albert H. Schaaf, of the realty firm of Higeman & Schaaf, and chairman of the city planning committee of the Indiana Real Estate association, is at the present time preparing a city planning bill to be presented to the law-making body.

On the coming tour of the state to be made by the president of the state realty association and other real estate men, Mr. Schaaf will ask for support of the city planning measure in every city visited.

A concerted effort will be made to bring about the establishment by legislation of a city planning commission in this state. At the present time seven states have city planning commissions. City planning literature will be distributed on the state tour and all measures taken to promote the campaign.

SETS NEW RECORD

Rush County Farmer Makes Big Shipment of Cattle.

News-Times Special Service: KNIGHTSTOWN, Ind., Sept. 18.—Albert Leasure, a Rush county farmer, has established a new record for farmers in this county. He shipped 197 head of fat cattle, averaging 1,400 pounds to Chicago, selling them at \$10.25 a hundred pounds. In addition he has 425 head of hogs that will average about 360 pounds and will sell for about \$11 a hundred.

DRUGGISTS TO REBEL AGAINST HIGH PRICES

Discuss Measures to Cut Cost at National Convention in Indianapolis.

International News Service: INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 18.—Measures to combat the high prices of many drugs because of the European war formed the chief topic of discussion of the 2,000 druggists and their wives at attendance at the National Association of Retail Druggists, which opened a four-day meeting this afternoon.

The war has caused the druggists to charge high prices for many drugs, but their margin of profit has been cut down, the druggists say. Except for a few speculators, who forced up the price of quinine and a few other drugs by attempting to "corner" it, all druggists have been hit, they assert.

A lively round of entertainment is planned for the visitors by the wholesale, manufacturing and retail druggists of Indianapolis. They include a special speedway race with Howard Wilcox and Charley Merz as drivers, dances, tours and a visit to the biological laboratory of Eli Lilly & Co. GOVERNOR FERRIS NAMES MEMORY DAY

Says, "It is Befitting That Both the Old and Young Should Honor Dead."

News-Times Special Service: LANSING, Mich., Sept. 18.—Gov. Ferris has issued the following proclamation designating Saturday, Sept. 20, as "Memory day."

"For the young there are no real memory days. The young have little concern about the past. They are impatiently peering into the future. The aged care little for the future, and naturally look to the great past. When men and women have lived three score and ten years, they look about in vain for father, mother and their playmates and friends of long ago. They live in their memories. In the United States only a few of the 'boys in blue' remain to tell of their Civil war experiences. The vast majority of our 109,000,000 people were born since 1861.

"Out of the war came a new republic baptized in the blood of human freedom. It is fitting that both the old and the young should do honor of the heroic dead. Strewing flowers over the graves of soldiers moves the living to nobler patriotic aspirations; strewing flowers over the graves of husband, wife, father, mother, son, daughter, brother, sister or comrade, awakens in the human heart an appreciation of the great human brotherhood."

HONOR UNIVERSITY HEAD

To Set Aside Day in Memory of First President of Michigan.

News-Times Special Service: LANSING, Mich., Sept. 18.—Supt. of public instruction Fred L. Keeler has designated Friday, Oct. 13, as Anzell day in all the public schools of the state, and he has requested that appropriate exercises be held in honor of the memory of James B. Anzell, who for nearly half a century was president of Michigan's great university.

"Teachers should acquaint the boys and girls of Michigan with the possibilities that our system of schools puts before them," said Supt. Keeler. "They should be made to know and feel that these things are within the reach of all. A study of the life and work of Dr. Anzell will be an inspiration to every child in Michigan and an inspiration that will be a deciding influence in the lives of many."

Rehearsals will be started next week for the pageant which will represent the four national periods of Terre Haute and Indiana history. The pageant will be staged in Memorial park where the lagoon will provide for the scenes representing the Wabash river. The week will close with a colonial ball. Terre Haute was founded 100 years ago, two months before Indiana became a state.

SECURE OPTION ON DUNES

People Will Have to Fight to Get Property Along Lake.


SISTERS ARE MOTHERS
