

CHARGES TALBOT WORKS IN COUNTY

Atty. F. J. L. Meyer Appears Against Owl Head in Fight for Readmission to Bar.

Charging that John W. Talbot, who has filed an application for admission to the St. Joseph county bar, has an undue influence over citizens of the county, F. J. Lewis Meyer, who is appearing with the bar association committee in opposition to his admission, filed a motion for a change of venue from the county in circuit court Thursday afternoon. Arguments on the change of venue will be heard in Michigan City at the convenience of Special Judge Harry R. Tutthill of that place, according to an agreement reached between him and at-

torneys for both sides Thursday afternoon. In support of his application for a change of venue, Atty. Meyer filed an affidavit stating that Talbot had agents out over the county who were influencing the residents in his behalf. Following the filing of the motion for a change of venue, attorneys for Talbot objected. At that time they stated that they also wanted to argue on Meyer's right to appear in the case, but no entry to this effect was made in the court's record. Talbot's petition for admission to the bar was brought in superior court, but Meyer took a change of venue to circuit court on the grounds that the court was prejudiced in Talbot's favor. A short time ago Judge Walter A. Funk disqualified himself and upon the failure of the parties to agree on a special judge, Judge Tutthill was named to hear the case. Attorneys for Talbot have sent a petition to the president and managers of the bar association protesting against the appearance of Meyer with the bar association's committee. It is charged in the petition that Meyer has personal ill feeling against Talbot. It is requested that unless Meyer withdraws his appear-

ance that the bar association committee be instructed to withdraw its appearance and permit Meyer to conduct the defense.

COLUMBUS DAY OBSERVED BY KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS

Banquet at Oliver Attended by 150. Address Made by R. E. Proctor of Elkhart.

Columbus day was appropriately celebrated by the local order of the Knights of Columbus last evening at the Oliver hotel, where the annual Columbus day banquet was held. Fully 50 members and their friends were present at the banquet. Hon. Robert E. Proctor of Elkhart made the chief address of the evening, giving a talk on "Catholic Citizenship." William A. McInerney of this city also spoke, his subject being "Columbus Day." Dr. J. B. Berteling, Grand Knight of the lodge, was the toastmaster of the affair, and the Rev. J. F. DeGroote asked the invocation. A feature of the evening was a violin solo by Mr. Rogers. Music was furnished at intervals throughout the evening by the Messick orchestra. The pro-

gram was closed by the singing of the national anthem. A dance followed.

The banquet of last evening was held in celebration of the discovery of America 424 years ago by Columbus, in honor of whom the Knights of Columbus organization was founded.

FINDS OLD VILLAGER

VIENNA, Oct. 13.—The war correspondent of the Zeit in one of his recent despatches records that while passing through Volhynia he met a villager of Karpilovka, who saw Napoleon on his way to Moscow in 1812. The man had recently celebrated his 120th birthday and himself related that as a boy of nine he had seen the great French emperor. The man is still in good health, and what makes his longevity so remarkable is that he has lived all his life in marshy district commonly regarded as unhealthy.

CANADIAN WOMEN TO REPLACE MEN IS PLAN

National Service Commission Discusses Proposition of Employing Them. OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 13.—Plans for women to take the place of men in Canadian industries were discussed by the National service com-

mission here Thursday. Men and women are to be registered, men qualified for overseas service are to be ascertained, and employers of labor are to be educated to place women in positions heretofore held by men, under the program mapped out. Women are to be encouraged to offer their services for industrial employment.
