YOUNG ROBBER IS SENT TO PRISON

Mother's Tears Fail to Save Youth Who Admitted to About 50 Robberies.

The tears of a broken-hearted mother failed to keep a wayward son from the penitentiary in circuit court Wednesday morning. As the boy's mother sat in the court room, her eyes red from weeping, George Henderson, 21 years old, confessed robber of more than 50 South Bend homes, was sentenced to spend from two to 14 years in the Michigan City prison by Judge Walter A. Funk.

The invention is a simple water meter connection whereby the meter is supported in an upright position thus presenting the face of the meter uppermost and in the most convenient position for reading the meter. The meter may be rapidly installed and manufactured much cheaper than other meters.

MAN WHO STOLE FORTUNE FOUND

PARIS, Oct. 18.—After a search that extended to every quarter of the globe Henri Rochette, charged with the embezzlement of nearly \$40,000,000 has been arrested. News of the arrest was given out by the police today.

Rochette was founder of the Franco-Spanish bank and various other financial organizations in France. His operations led to a French political scandal and indirectly to the murder of Gaston Calmette, editor of the Le Figaro, by Mme. Caillaux.

The career of Rochette has been both romantic and spectacular. He began life as a brush boy in a barber shop. Later he worked as a waiter in a cheap restaurant.

The bourse was electrified on March 8, 1908, to learn that the bankers had embezzled millions of the customers' money. He was tried, found guilty and sentenced to two years, but escaped on a legal technicality.
