**AT THE AUDITORIUM.**  
It is said Lillian Gish has adopted a course of training as strenuous as a professional pugilist in order to get into the best possible condition for her "Rough house" work in "Diana of the Follies" being presented at the Auditorium theater today. Miss Gish has several free-for-all fights in the picture, including one at her husband's house in which several chorus girls mix in. In the theater scene one of the chorus girls emerged with a black eye as the result of coming in too close contact with demure Miss Gish's fist. Miss Gish's portrayal of the temperamental actress in this picture is said to be one of the best parts she has yet assumed. Today's Keystone comedy is called "Hearts and Sparks," featuring Hank Mann. Tomorrow brings a popular player—Helen Holmes in "The Lass of the Lumberlands," a sensational chapter play in sixteen episodes. In order to enjoy this story one should not fail to see this first release. "Little Peggy O'Moore" is the name of a quaint drama booked for the Oliver theater for Sunday matinee and night, playing at popular prices.

**AT THE ORPHEUM.**  
It's a rapid fire bill that shows at the Orpheum the last half of the week. And it's a good one. There is not a dull act on the list and not an act but what is sure to go good. Honors of the bill are about evenly divided in popular favor between Mrs. Eva Fay, who presents a high class act in Thaumaturgy, and the Metropolitan Dancing Girls, who with George and May Lefevre have a big act to close the show. Mrs. Fay, who has been here several times before, is just as clever as ever in reading the minds and questions of the audience. The questions which can be written on paper supplied by the assistants or on any other scrap of material, are not collected, so Mrs. Fay has no previous knowledge of the question. Five numbers are presented by dancing girls, or rather four by the girls and one by George Lefevre, who has a Scotch solo dance that is above the ordinary. The closing number is entitled an "Hawaiian Medley" and the costuming and scenery is designed especially for the occasion. Bob Knapp and Chris Cornella, "A Pot-pourri of Vaudeville," open the bill and they do it acceptably. They tumble, sing, crack jokes and present musical numbers with equal facility. Faber and Waters who have a duo skit labeled "Nutology" are both attractive and clever and the "deadlier" member of the two is the rouser of the act, Paul Bawens. "The Human Freight Train," works in blackface and has a good line of talk. He sings and dances and his last offering, an imitation of a freight train, is exceptionally good.

**AT THE LASALLE.**  
"The Love Girl", is the title of today's feature picture to be shown at the Lasalle with Ella Hall in the leading role of a pretty little maid, on who, left to the care of an aunt in her younger years, finally conquers all around her by her sunny disposition. It is a Bluebird production and is particularly noteworthy on account of the beautiful scenic exteriors utilized and the elaborate settings. Carlyle Blackwell will be featured in tomorrow's picture entitled "The Spitfire." The story, by Edward Peple, author of "The Prince Chap" and "A Pair of Sixes," is amusing, and blends action, comedy and sentiment most excitingly.

**AT THE COLONIAL.**  
Today's feature picture at the Colonial is entitled "Saint, Devil and The Woman." Several of the most famous and popular novels in the English language are based upon the theme of dual personality, and this element figures very prominently in this big Pathe subject.
