## TIGHT GAME LOST TO SILVER EDGES

### Premona Eleven Loses Close Contest to Benders in Last Minute of Play.

When Miller of the Silver Edges charged through the Premona line and backfield, in the last few minutes of the fourth quarter the locals hoped of taking a tight game went glimmering, and they had to satisfy themselves with the small end of a 6 to 2 score. The game was played on the north side grounds, Sunday afternoon.

In the first half the Benders' line seemed very weak, and the "orange" lads went through for repeated gains, but were unable to get the ball over. Mishawaka scored when a field goal was kicked by Spencer, in the second quarter. A chance to score was lost when a Premona player fumbled a pass back of the goal line. Several men were knocked out during the game, but none were hurt seriously. Spencer was taken out when he was kicked in the face in the third quarter.

The Premona started the second half with a rush and carried the ball within the visitors' ten yard line by a series of short passes and end runs. Here they were stopped and on an attempted pass lost the ball to the Benders. The play saw-sawed back and forth the rest of the quarter and most of the last period. On a general mixup in the last few minutes of play, Miller got the ball and made a 40-yard run through the locals' scattered defense for the "Silver's" first touchdown. With three minutes to play the Mishawaka made a valiant effort to score, but on two penalizations for off side their hopes faded.

## KABLE WILL OPEN RESTAURANT HERE

### Negotiating for Suitable Site in the Downtown District.

For some days past there has been rumors of a deal in course of consummation looking to the establishment of a new catering and restaurant stand in Mishawaka. It is understood that the new business is to be opened by Messrs. Clark & Kable, well-known restaurant men of Toledo and South Bend, and operating a dozen or more lunch rooms and cafeterias in Indiana and Ohio.

A representative of that concern is known to have been in the city the past week negotiating for a downtown site to be utilized for a first class eating house, recognized as a much-needed enterprise. The deal is said to have been well under way for a location at a central point, and convenient of access. Details of the matter are not yet ready for publication, but it is understood the negotiations involve quite an outlay on the part of those behind the project.

At the present time there are only two restaurants in the business section of the city, and as the building occupied by one of them has been purchased by Sen. Summers for an office for the News-Times, the owner will have to seek a new location, while the Ross restaurant has more business, according to the proprietor, than it can conveniently handle.

While in the past there have been repeated rumors that Kable would open a restaurant here, nothing has ever been done in the matter, but it is understood that plans for the enterprise have now been fully developed.

## PROGRESSIVE AUTO GETS INTO PARADE

### Aftermath of Saturday's Big Demonstration—Republicans Work Sunday.

Saturday night's big democratic demonstration was on every one's tongue yesterday, and the expression was freely reiterated that a Mishawaka's democratic majority would be an overwhelming one. A considerable portion of the money brought into town by the republicans Saturday was taken by Wilson supporters, and it is not believed any more will be offering. It is stated that the money is part of the fund being trotted around from place to place by the republicans for effect, and is never allowed to remain longer than about 24 hours in any one city.

As showing the trend of election betting, and how it favors the democrats, it may be mentioned that several wagers posted some days ago, are still seeking takers. For instance \$25 has been offered that St. Joseph county will go for Wilson; \$25 that Ohio will go for Wilson; \$25 Mishawaka goes Wilson, and \$25 that Wilson will be elected. Bets were still on the board at a late hour Sunday night.

Breaks Into Parade.

George Williams of the Woolen Co., who, as was stated in the News-Times Sunday, was in the democratic parade Saturday night, called up the writer of the article Sunday stating that there must have been some mistake, as he was a progressive.
