

### GARY OFFICIALS UNDER ARREST

#### Mayor and Three Others Are Accused of Fraud in Re-cent Election.

GARY, Ind., Feb. 21.—R. O. Johnson, mayor; William Forbes, chief of police, and C. M. Renolett, city seal-er, were placed under arrest by U. S. marshals late Tuesday, charged with violating the election laws. Howard Hay, holding a county position here, also was arrested. Each man gave a bond of \$5,000. The arrest followed a federal grand jury indictment returned at Indianapolis a few days ago.

The men will be arraigned in federal court at Indianapolis, March 21. All Are Surprised.

Each of the four defendants professed ignorance of the charges against him and the mayor and chief of police declared politicians responsible for their indictment. Hay is chairman and Renolett, secretary of the Gary city republican committee and in that capacity directed much of the political activities here during the presidential election.

Surprise was occasioned because there were only four indictments, as rumors had linked the names of at least 15 others, including steel mill officials, but United States Marshal Storen set these rumors at rest soon after his arrival from Indianapolis by announcing there were only four Gary indictments. He hinted, however, of other arrests to be made in the county.

### NEW STATE IS PROPOSED
