U. S. MAJOR KILLS SELF IN FRANCE

B. B. Lewis, Member of Aviation Section, Entered Army After War Began.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8. — Maj. Birdseye B. Lewis, detailed to the aviation section of the signal corps and attached to Gen. Pershing's staff, whose death was previously reported to relatives in private cables, committed suicide last Saturday. The war department was so advised Wednesday by Gen. Pershing in a message giving no details.

Maj. Lewis, who was 29 years old and a resident of Millbrook, N. Y., entered the army after the war began. He is survived by his widow, a daughter of Oakleigh Thorn, New York, capitalist.

The deaths of one non-commissioned officer and three enlisted men attached to the expeditionary forces also were reported today by Gen. Pershing. Two died from accidental wounds and two from natural causes.

Sergt. Carl C. Taylor, infantry, died Oct. 27, from a gun shot wound believed to have been suffered accidentally. His next of kin is his father, Chester O. Taylor, Dover, N. H.

Private James Shea, attached to a truck company, died yesterday from accidental injuries to his head. His emergency address is J. J. Comer, New York city.

Privates Wagoner Roland Naylor and Chester H. Shapleigh, both of the infantry, died Nov. 4, from pneumonia. Naylor's next of kin is his father, Walter Naylor, Pleasantville, N. J., and Shapleigh's is his mother, Mrs. M. Shapleigh, Elliott, Me.

15,000 Pounds of Jam for Soldiers

NEW YORK, Nov. 8. — Fifteen thousand pounds of jam, put up by the women of Fairfield county, Connecticut, for wounded men in France together with fittings for French diet kitchens, clothing and food, will be carried in seven great trucks in a parade down Fifth avenue Thursday. Virtually all the women of the county cooperated and every kind of berry and fruit grown there was utilized.

War Pictures From Italian Front Stirring

By far the most remarkable war pictures that South Bend has ever seen were revealed at the Oliver theater yesterday in "The Italian Battlefront." These pictures are things of life reflecting the greatest period in the history of the world, and they pass like a momentous pageant before the eye. If there is romance in war, it is to be found in scenes that the camera has caught with impressive accuracy.

When Victor Hugo wrote "Toilers of the Sea," he could not possibly have foreseen the toilers of war disclosed in the official war films from Italy that should inspire even the most weak-kneed slacker who walks the streets. There is something too fine and brave about these pictures that life for its own sake is made to seem trivial. Italians are naturally picturesque, and this quality is brought vividly to mind in these pictures, especially those showing warfare in the Alps.

The spectator is made to realize that the war was not all fighting—that labor of the hardest kind goes with it. To see a long string of men, knee-deep in snow, dragging heavy cannon up a mountain side, makes the onlooker conscious of the tremendous physical side of the war. There are neither horses nor mules to help these soldiers climb to the victory on which all our hearts are set. The men, harnessed in long narrow lines, tug and pull like brutes. War may make brutes of men, but the soldiers who scale the Alps, leave something to the imagination. On the heights they celebrate mass at an altar cut from ice. Candles are lighted on this altar and in the snow and cold a man of the church robes himself hurriedly for the ceremony.

There are, too, scenes of fighting on land and sea that stir the blood, as well as parades of troops that win admiration for Italy. Bigger guns are brought up by main strength to keep the battle going and the result of their work is not to be doubted. Incidentally, the Austrian prisoners, marched into camp are a sorry looking lot, but one of them, a youth, salutes the camera as he passes, with a smile on his lips. Even an enemy, with sporting blood in his veins, is to be admired. "The Italian Battlefront" is an inspiration. It means everything that is brave and loyal. Go to it. The pictures will be shown every day for the balance of the week, starting at 1 o'clock and running continuously.

All of the comical cut-ups from the "Katzenjammer Kids" cartoons appear in the musical comedy version of the comic supplement pictures that will be presented at the Oliver theater Sunday matinee and night. Hans and Fritz, Ma Katzenjammer, Der Professor, Der Captain and all the rest of the funny characters of the cartoons take part in the swift moving action of the play.

AT THE AUDITORIUM. "More Truth Than Poetry," with Mme. Petrova as the star, is today's special attraction at the Auditorium. The story tells of Ashton Blair, an unsuccessful lawyer, who is given such valuable aid by his clever wife that he finally wins fame. U-Boat Toll Lowest Since Warfare Began

LONDON, Nov. 8.—A marked decrease in the British merchant ships sunk during the last week is noted in the admiralty report Wednesday night. Only eight vessels over 1,600 tons were sunk by mine or submarine and four vessels under that tonnage. No fishing vessels were sunk.

The summary: Arrivals, 2,384; sailings, 2,379. British merchant vessels over 1,600 tons sunk by mine or submarine, including two previously, eight; under 1,600 tons, including one previously, four.

Fishing vessels sunk, none. British merchant vessels unsuccessfully attacked including five previously, six.

The sinkings of British merchant ships recorded in the latest admiralty report are the smallest in point of number since the unrestricted submarine warfare began early in the war. They probably are the smallest in tonnage also, for while in the week ending Sept. 16, only eight vessels of 1,600 tons or over were sunk, 20 vessels under that tonnage were destroyed. The next best record in point of number was in the week ending Sept. 20, when 12 vessels were sunk, 11 large and two small.

ROME, Nov. 8.—The Italian shipping losses from submarines in all seas for the week ending Nov. 4, were two steamers under 1,500 tons, and three sailing craft under one hundred tons.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—The German reichstag will meet again Nov. 22, according to a cabled report received today from Zurich, Switz.

TWO HURT BY FALLING STACK. SULLIVAN, Ind., Nov. 8.—Caught beneath a falling smokestack at the new Millard coal mine, William Riley, 42 years old, and Charles Hill, 44 years old, were injured severely and were rushed to a Terre Haute hospital.
