ANNOUNCE EXAMINATIONS FOR CIVIL SERVICE JOBS

An examination for field superintendents in insect control, working for the bureau of entomology, department of agriculture, will be held at Indianapolis next Saturday, according to information received at the local post office.

The position will pay \$1,800 to \$2,400 a year and the duties of the appointees will be to direct large numbers of scouts, laborers and others engaged in destroying vegetation which may be infested with the European corn-borer.

On Tuesday an examination will be given for the position of metallurgist in the ordnance department at a salary of \$3,400 to \$4,600 a year. On Wednesday examinations will be given for positions and salaries as follows: Deputy shipping commissioner, \$1,140; apprentice plate cleaner, apprentice transferer, apprentice picture engraver and apprentice letter engraver, \$800 to \$4,800; claims examiner, \$1,800; welfare worker, (female), \$1,200 to \$1,600; industrial research clerk, \$1,600 to \$1,800; special agent (female), \$1,400 to \$1,600; junior computer (male or female), for duty at Pittsburgh, Pa., \$1,020, and assistant animal husbandman, \$1,200 to \$1,600.

BRINGS ACTION TO GET POSSESSION OF SHOP

George Becker, defendant in action brought by Erve E. Ellis in Justice Wypyszynski's court against Becker and Felix DeGroote for possession of a blacksmith shop on South Bend av., has appealed the case to the circuit court after a jury returned a verdict for the plaintiff. Damages amounting to \$100 were refused the plaintiff.

Becker has been renting the shop of DeGroote who sold it to Ellis recently. Ellis demanded possession of the property which was refused by Becker who said he had an understanding with DeGroote that the property was to be sold to him.

Lawrence Tsherski brought action against John C. Dollman in the justice's court for possession of property at 1914 E. Division st. and \$25 damages.

JEWISH RELIEF FUND TO BE RAISED BY DRIVE

The sailors cross the American desert and both were injured on the first day of their trip. They are selling cards to defray the expenses of the trip.


