

ENROSE SOUNDS G. O. P. WARNING IN SENATE FIGHT

Committee Increases Activity and Fear Loss of Control.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 19.—Sen. Boies Penrose's warning to the republicans that unless they are on their guard they will lose control of the next senate is being taken seriously and already it is resulting in renewed activity on the part of the branch of the republican national committee, which has charge of the senatorial campaign. There will be a special meeting of the campaign committee of the national committee in New York shortly to consider the senate situation.

May Lose In Indiana.

A good many senatorial nominations are yet to be made and until they are made it will not be possible, so the republicans leaders say, to get into this phase of the situation full-handed. Both the old parties, it develops, have been making surveys of the senatorial situation in various states and there is agreement that there is a possibility of the republicans losing a senator in Connecticut, one in Ohio, one in Wisconsin, one in Missouri, one in New York, one in Indiana and one in New Hampshire, while there is the possibility of the democrats losing a senator in each of the following states: Kentucky, Oregon, Idaho, California, Colorado and Maryland. Thus there are seven republican bad spots and six democratic bad spots, as the situation is analyzed at this time by the knowing politicians.

Democrats Better Off.

There is general agreement among both the democrats and republicans who are acquainted with the situation as it exists today that the democrats are somewhat better off in the six states in which they might lose than are the republicans in the seven states in which they might fail to hold what they now have.

From all indications now the League of Nations issue will enter into some of the senatorial contests in an important way. For instance, New Hampshire, where Frank B. Brandegee, republican, is to seek reelection the supporters of the league will attempt to bring about his defeat. Brandegee has not yet been nominated, but it is certain that he will be as he controls the political machine in the state. The democratic candidate may be Homer S. Cummings, former chairman of the democratic national committee. The women in Connecticut are after Brandegee because he has fought woman suffrage from the date the constitutional amendment was proposed and is looked upon as the influence that prevents the Connecticut legislature from ratifying the amendment.

George H. Moses, republican, of New Hampshire, another irreconcilable on the treaty, is seeking a re-nomination and will probably get it. In that state, as in Connecticut, the supporters of the league will seek to defeat him. It has been asserted from time to time that the people of New Hampshire are overwhelmingly for the league and there is the general expectation that there will be a real contest over the senatorship, with the league as the issue.

Big Fight Here.

The present outlook in both Ohio and Indiana, according to information that reaches the national capital, is that there will be a real senatorial fight in each state.

Irvine L. Lenoir, republican, of Wisconsin, who wants to come back, is being opposed by Sen. LaFollette and the LaFollette machine. Republican national managers fear that unless the situation in that state can be straightened out a democrat will be elected. As for Sen. LaFollette, who has been counted as a republican in giving the republicans a majority of two in the senate, the disposition among the republicans now is to regard him as out of the party. He has been so regarded in the past, however, but has continued to vote with the republicans on most subjects.

Is there subtle, unseen influence that is reaching out to bring about the defeat of senators who have murky war records? is a question that politicians at the capital are asking. A. J. Gronna, republican, of North Dakota, who was not in favor of the United States going to war with Germany and who voted against the treaty of peace and the League of Nations has been defeated for re-nomination by a non-partisan leaver. Republicans realize that this one vote is as good as lost. The non-partisan leaver will not be expected to follow the republicans blindly, if he agrees to act with them at all, and it is assumed he will be elected.

Puzzle In New York.

The situation in New York is so rickety that, as the best judges see it, the republicans are not at all certain

that they can re-elect Sen. James W. Wadsworth. On the democratic side it is admitted by the democrats that the republicans might be able to defeat Sen. J. C. W. Beckham of Kentucky; that they may also be able to retire Sen. George E. Chamberlain of Oregon and that a republican may be elected in Idaho to succeed John F. Nugent. They also are dubious over the outcome of the contests in California, Maryland and Colorado, where senatorial seats now occupied by democrats are being fought for with determination on both sides.

PERFUME AND SILK BUT CRY FOR MILK

Ask Return to Simple Life in German Towns.

BERLIN, Aug. 19.—Since the raising of the blockade, Germany has imported 19,000,000,000 marks' worth of silks, perfumes, chocolates, oranges, cigarettes and other luxuries from abroad, and the poor are clamoring for oatmeal and condensed milk, according to German advocates of "the simple life."

A new movement known as the League for the Regeneration of Germany, which preaches plain living and high thinking, a return to old-time simplicity, coupled with a revival of intellectuality as opposed to the crass materialism of the present day, has been started here. It depreciates the daily issuance of 26,000,000 marks in paper currency by the government.

An appeal is made to the people to confine themselves to the essentials of clothes or luxury foods, no more expensive pleasure trips abroad; no more costly presents.

The promoters, among whom are former Finance Minister Count Roedern; the economic expert Walter Rathenau and a dozen well-known professors and social welfare workers, emphasize that they are not ascetics nor prohibitionists but that they make a plain appeal to the common sense of the people to restrict their general expenditure for the sake of the Fatherland.

It is claimed for the movement that it is entirely non-partisan and that it has the official endorsement of the government.
