THREE EVENTS OF CIRCUIT RACES GO INTO SPLIT HEATS

Millie Irwin Captures Bellevue Stratford Stake of \$2,500.

By Associated Press: PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 18.—When the Grand Circuit races were resumed at Narbeth, Pa., Thursday the track was dry and fast, but a strong breeze blowing down the back stretch made the time averages slower than on the opening day. Split heats resulted in all three of the stake features. The \$2,500 Bellevue Stratford stake for 2:05 trotters went to Millie Irwin. The first two heats were nose finishes and Sister Bertha got the judge's verdict in the second; in a thrilling finish, while Millie Irwin outfooted her rival in the deciding heat.

Four heats were necessary in the B. F. Keith Theater stake of \$1,000. King Harvester, Brustlof and Bettina winning in turn. Bettina took the fastest heat of the three in 2:07 1-2 and also the final, which was little more than a jog in 2:15 1-4.

Slipper Maintains Record.

Tommy Murphy's Slipper, unbeaten so far this season, won the first two heats of the Naubek stake for three-year-old trotters, but made a break in the third, and Sakura came through with a rush and won in 2:12. The novelty 2:40 trot at one mile and 100 yards was won by Fluviana in 2:23.

W. H. Gocher, secretary of the National Trotting association announced he had arranged a match race between the trotter, Peter Manning, and the pacer, Single G, to take place at the Hartford Grand Circuit meeting on Sept. 7. France Scarcely Able to Believe Suzanne's Defeat

Conquest of "Wonder Girl" Most Bitter Reverse for French to Swallow.

BY EDWIN M. HULLINGER, United Press Staff Correspondent. PARIS, Aug. 18.—Defeat of Miss Suzanne Lengien in the American woman's tennis championships, the last and perhaps the worst blow of a disastrous sport season, has left France almost in despair.

When Carpenter went down before Jack Dempsey, France took the job to her national pride rather philosophically with the consolation: "We still have our grand Suzanne." Paris hardly could believe that the wonderful little maid of the courts, the superwoman of tennis, had met defeat from an opponent whom she defeated so easily earlier in the season.

France Suffers Reverses.

From the start of the season, France has suffered a succession of sport reverses.

The English horse, Lemonora, won the Grand Prix. The Belgian, Scieur won the Tour de France bicycle race. The Britisher, Bennett, won the Grand Prix motorcycle race. Joe Murphy, American, won the Grand Prix automobile race. Italy took the first three places in the Seine swimming race. An American dog won the blue ribbon in the grand dog show. An American team won the rifle championship at Lyons. Dempsey knocked out Carpenter and Mike Lengien lost to Mrs. Molla Mallory.

WOMEN NET STARS EXHIBIT GOOD FORM AT FORREST HILLS

Mrs. Mallory and Miss Browne Look Like Best Bets to Cop Title.

By Associated Press: FORREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 18.—Championship tennis came to the fore in a striking manner on the courts of the West Side Tennis Club here Thursday afternoon, in the round before the semi-final of the woman's national singles tennis championships. Of the sixty-four entrants who began playing in the 1927 titular tournament but four survived the afternoon play. Of the quartet, three are past or present national champions and the fourth holds a similar position in Mexico.

The tournament among the best women players of the United States also attested the high standard of the game played in the state of California. In addition to Mrs. Molla Bjurstedt Mallory, formerly of Norway, but now of New York City, and winner of the title in 1915-16-17-18 and 1922, the survivors included Mrs. May Sutton Bundy of Los Angeles, title holder in 1904 and the only American woman to win a championship on the famous courts of Wimbledon, England, and Miss Mary K. Browne of Santa Monica, Cal., three times holder of the title in the years 1912, 13 and 14.

Miss Browne Plays Well.

The fourth survivor Mrs. C. V. Hitchins, although playing for a local club, learned far more than the rudiments of her tennis on the Pacific coast and put the finishing touches on her game during recent seasons in and about the city of Mexico.

The exhibition of completely rounded out tennis given by Miss Browne in her match against Mrs. B. Cole of Boston, which she won 6-1, 6-2, would appear to give her an excellent claim for a place in the finals.

Mrs. Mallory was not put to a severe test in defeating Mrs. H. P. Falk of New York, 6-2, 6-1.

The contest between Mrs. Bundy and Mrs. Hitchins was really closer than the score would appear to indicate. Mrs. Bundy, however, possessed greater power and control of her shots and won, 6-1, 6-2.

Mrs. Hitchins won the right to play Miss Browne Friday by defeating Mrs. Stuart Greene of Ardrey, N. Y., 8-6, 6-2.

Rapid advance was also made in the woman's doubles championship, the second round being completed without any particular upset.

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
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The Story of Molla's Revenge Told in Pictures



Look how confident Mrs. Molla Bjurstedt Mallory looks in the picture on the left. This was just before her match with Suzanne Lengien for the tennis championship of America. The center picture shows Suzanne on the arm of a tennis official and in tears, as she defaulted the match after Molla had won the first set 6-2 and the first two points of the second set. On the right is Molla leaving the courts, dissatisfied at the outcome of the match. She wanted to beat Suzanne even more decisively because the French champion had beaten her in Europe and had said that Molla had not even furnished stiff opposition.
