



5TH DAY OF TREE DRIVE FEATURED BY \$1200 ORDER

Mishawaka Committee Nears Its Quota—500 Trees to Be Taken Monday.

Penn Township's drive for trees to dot the three-mile stretch of Lincoln Highway allotted to Mishawaka for the memorial of those who made the supreme sacrifice during the late World War was given a new spurt Friday when the Mishawaka Woolen Manufacturing Company subscribed to \$1,200 worth of trees, or for 160 trees.

This single subscription brings the total of trees already taken to considerable in excess of 350 trees and the committee now believes it will go over the top before Monday night with its quota of 500 trees.

The following names were announced Friday as purchasers of trees, exclusive of names previously given out: Mico-Kin Club, West End State Bank, H. W. Gillie, Raymond Vander Hayden, C. B. Webster, Mishawaka Furniture Co., Miss Myrna Eberhart and William Strick.

The St. Joseph County Memorial Tree Forestry Association, under whose auspices this tree drive is being conducted, plans to preserve the memory of all service men and red cross nurses who served in the World War, in a living avenue of beautiful trees, arching and shading Lincoln Highway, along its entire stretch of sixteen miles in this county. Trees will be planted at 60-foot intervals on both sides of the highway. At each end of the highway, bronze tablets will be erected.

The tree drive will not end until October 8, but Mishawaka will not wait until the last day. Its quota is now within sight and it is expected that the 500 trees will have been taken before Monday.

Headquarters of the Mishawaka committee is at the Belger Furniture Store, where an entire window and its inside floor space has been given over to the committee. A huge relief map of the three-mile stretch for Penn Township's 500 trees is seen in the window, and as fast as trees are taken, a small red pin is placed on the map indicating that the tree has been sold.

The trees will be planted early in October and the motor trip to Duluth, Minn., Milwaukee and the Delta, Wis.
