JUDGE GALLAHER WILL NOT SEEK RE-ELECTION

Special to The News-Times: LAFORTE, Ind., Oct. 2.—Announcement has been made that Judge James F. Gallaher, of this city, one of the best known jurists of northern Indiana, will not be a candidate for re-election.

Judge Gallaher is in very poor health and many of his friends fear his inability to continue his judicial activities until the end of the term, though he is determined to hold court sessions until the expiration of his term, hoping that his health will materially improve.

Judge John C. Richter, who occupied the bench for two terms previous to the election of Judge Gallaher, has announced his candidacy for the republican nomination, and it is expected that State's Attorney Rowley will also be a candidate.

Norman F. Wolf, law partner of Congressman Hickey, is mentioned as the probable democratic candidate.

Utilities Body to Fix Fares For Kazoo Traction Lines

LANSING, Mich., Oct. 2.—Hearings in the application of the Kalamazoo Street Railway company and the city for an adjustment of street railway rates with the public utility commission were concluded Friday with neither side proposing a schedule of fares.

It was claimed by the company and conceded by the city that the present rate of 8 cents cash fare and four tickets for 25 cents does not yield sufficient revenue to pay operating expenses, taxes, depreciation and a reasonable return on the lowest valuation found for the properties. The city claims, however, and the company seemed to admit, that an effort to charge materially higher rates would cause fewer persons to ride on the cars and would actually reduce revenues.

Plan Drive for Building At Agricultural College

LANSING, Mich., Oct. 2.—Alumni of the Michigan Agricultural college have decided to resume a campaign to secure for the East Lansing college a union building similar to the Michigan union at Ann Arbor.

A drive for \$150,000 for a union building was started a year or two ago and that amount was raised with comparatively little difficulty. It was decided to postpone building in view of prevailing high prices of material.

The new development in the plans was a decision to raise more money instead of going ahead with the building as originally planned.

At a recent meeting of the alumni association, which was attended by representatives from several cities, it was decided that the \$150,000 building contemplated would be entirely inadequate for the students at the M. A. C.

Mahers and Cops Seize Still and Booze on Farm

Special to The News-Times: ELKHART, Ind., Oct. 2.—Prohibition Enforcement Officer Harry Mahers of South Bend and local police late this afternoon swooped down on the farm of William Baider, six miles north of the city and seized a still used in the manufacture of moonshine whisky and confiscated six gallons of the finished product. A quantity of mash for use in the operation was destroyed.

Baider was held by Elkhart police under \$1,000.

Eleven Held as Members Of Alleged Burglary Ring

KALAMAZOO, Mich., Oct. 2.—Charged with receiving goods stolen by the alleged burglary ring, Henry Melles was taken into custody Friday morning. He is the eleventh person arrested for alleged complicity in operations of the ring, which the officers charge, was responsible for more than a score of burglaries in southwestern Michigan during the last few months. Charles Weiss, an alleged member of the league, was arrested while out on bail on a charge of robbing a Michigan Central train.

For more than 30 years he was a news writer on Terre Haute papers. He is survived by the widow.

Albertson of Claypool Saturday filed suit for divorce against Frederick Albertson in the Kosciusko circuit court. She asks \$4,000 alimony.

BREEDERS TO MEET

WARSAW, Oct. 2.—Breeders of Chester white hogs of Kosciusko county have called a meeting to be held in Warsaw Oct. 15 at which time a permanent organization of breeders will be formed. Behind the movement are Noble Turner, of Nappanee; Ralph Gunter, of Warsaw; L. E. Thomas, of Warsaw; and D. E. Bruner, of Claypool, who had 50 head of Chester whites on exhibition at the Kosciusko county fair during the last week.

ISSUE HUNTING PERMITS

WARSAW, Oct. 2.—C. Johnson, 28, of 219 College st., South Bend, will spend the next two weeks hunting duck on the lakes of Kosciusko county. Saturday he procured a hunting license from County Clerk R. H. Butler. A total of 25 hunting permits were issued Saturday by the county clerk, one going to L. D. Zimmerman, 75, of Seaman, O. Nearly a score of boys under 16 years of age have been issued hunting permits this year.

FOUR ANNOUNCE RACE FOR SHERIFF OFFICE

Special to The News-Times: WARSAW, Ind., Oct. 2.—The political pot in Kosciusko county has started to boil. Miss Hazel Breading, for many years an assistant in the office of the county auditor, will be a candidate for that office to succeed the present incumbent, Tom J. Nye.

At this time the office of sheriff seems to be the most popular place in the court house, as four candidates already have announced their intention of competing for the place. The men are: Horon Huffer, present deputy sheriff under Sheriff Charles B. Moon; Wesley Brown, former county commissioner; James Snyder of Warsaw and Milo Malloy, trustee of Van Buren township in which the town of Milford, is located.

OIL STOCK SALESMAN GUILTY OF FORGERY

BRAZIL, Oct. 2.—After a jury trial, William W. Cooper, an oil stock salesman of Indianapolis, was found guilty of forgery in the Clay circuit court Saturday. He will be sentenced Monday. Cooper is alleged to have passed fraudulent checks to two local banks.

Officials of two Columbus, Ind., banks identified Cooper as a man having passed worthless checks in that city. Contradicting the testimony of the local bankers, officials of Kokomo banks said Cooper had transacted business with them on the same day and during the same hour he is alleged to have passed the checks here. Cooper was formerly in the insurance business in Kokomo.

ONE KILLED, THREE HURT IN ACCIDENT

POINT ISABELL, Oct. 2.—George Carter, 24 years old, of Mahomet, Ill., was killed and three other persons seriously injured when an automobile which he was driving collided with a machine driven by E. H. Bonham, of Elwood, Ind., here today.

Carter was thrown from his automobile and his neck was broken. Mrs. Frank Carter, the victim's mother, who was riding with him, was injured seriously. Bonham and his wife suffered severe cuts and bruises.

ALLEGED BOOTLEGER FACES FORGERY COUNT

Special to The News-Times: LAFORTE, Ind., Oct. 2.—Gottfried Franzen, of Porter county, recently was charged with bootlegging. He is now in the county jail on a charge of forgery. Franzen gave a check for \$55 to pay a fine assessed against him for bootlegging. The check was returned as worthless with the notation "no funds." In addition to facing prosecution for check forgery, Franzen will be compelled to serve a term of days at the penal farm for liquor law violation.

MARQUETTE PRESIDENT IS SENT TO DETROIT

DETROIT, Oct. 2.—Rev. John P. McNichols, S.J., dean of the department of arts and sciences of Marquette college, Milwaukee, has been appointed to the presidency of the University of Detroit and will assume office Monday. It was announced here this afternoon. He succeeded Rev. William T. Doran, S.J., who has been transferred to Marquette. The change was made by the general society at Rome.

PLAN LOANS TO BOOST U. S. CATTLE INDUSTRY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Important results are being obtained from the agricultural credit arrangements made possible by extended powers of the war finance corporation, Eugene Meyer, managing director of the corporation, said today upon his return from a tour.

Director Meyer said he was convinced that the agricultural industry in particular is in need of investment and has suffered from lack of adequate financing and felt certain that the government credit, now available, would establish the needed financial backing. It would act basically, according to the corporation head, to save the breeding and feeding herds of the nation.

HOG CHOLERA SPREADS IN ELKHART COUNTY

WARSAW, Oct. 2.—There has been a rapid spread of hog cholera during the last week among herds of swine belonging to farmers residing between Nappanee, in Elkhart county, and Etna Green, in Kosciusko county, according to an announcement today by T. A. Parker, county agricultural agent of Kosciusko county.

With a view of devising ways and means for combating a further spread of the disease, a meeting will be held Monday noon at the farm of William Persons, northwest of Atwood and east of Etna Green. Farmers will be instructed in sanitation and quarantine measures. Representatives of the state veterinarian, now in Kosciusko county, have recommended that all hog growers have their swine vaccinated.

Kazoo Man Decapitated When Train Hits Auto

NALAMAZOO, Mich., Oct. 2.—Albert Smith, 35, was instantly killed when his automobile was struck by a Michigan Central train at a crossing here. He was decapitated. He leaves a widow and seven children, one an infant of two weeks.

GUNTHER FARM SOLD

GOSHEN, Oct. 2.—The Gunther-Burnell farm, situated in Greendfield township, Lagrange county, a short distance from the village of Brighton, has been sold by Mrs. Charles P. Gunther, widow of the well-known Chicago candy manufacturer, to John McCuen, of St. Louis. The consideration was \$100,000.

Interstate Commerce Commission Idea of Consolidation Meets Objections.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Proposed consolidation of 182 principal railroads into 19 big competing systems, as announced by the interstate commerce commission, has a long, long trail to wander before it becomes a reality. It cannot become effective within a year, at least.

First, the commission must send copies to the governors of all states and to the railroads.

Then, at a time not yet set, a hearing must be held when any objections by state authorities or railroads may be filed. While every effort has been made to make the present plan objection-proof, it is probable that it will emerge from the hearing badly cut up and interlined.

Crux of Merger

Then the commission will have to face the tough problem of valuation and financing on which the whole success of the plan depends.

The commission must determine the value of every line to be merged. Bonds of the corporation that be merged properties must at par not exceed the total value of the properties consolidated.

With valuation fixing and financing out of the way, the actual merging may proceed.

The present plan, the commission announces, is based on the most comprehensive survey of American commercial enterprise in its relation to transportation ever made.
