## STAGE CELEBRITY TO LECTURE HERE AT CLUB MEETING

### Noted State Figure For 50 Years to Address Woman's Club Saturday.

"Fifty Years of Make-Believe" is the title of the lecture which will be delivered before a general meeting of the Mishawaka Woman's club on Saturday afternoon by Frederick Warde, for the last 50 years a noted figure of the stage both in England and the United States. The program committee was unusually fortunate in being able to secure Mr. Warde for an appearance here, and it promises that the Saturday meeting to be held in the library auditorium, will be one of the finest of the year.

Mr. Warde, whose work has always been standard and classic drama, is able to name many of his contemporaries such as famous actors as Edwin Booth, Henry Irving, John McCullough, Charlotte Cushman and Adelaide Neilson, and his memories of these noted characters of the half century form one of the most interesting portions of his lecture. He is said to possess a personality of unusual charm, together with a gracious manner and a versatile intelligence, which gives him the faculty of taking his hearer with him in his travels, and of making an audience feel the charm of his acting even as his former audiences were moved by his reading of the unsurpassed lines of Laertes, and other noted parts, when he was associated with Edwin Booth.

He stands as a champion of the stage profession at all times for, as he says, "Believe me, the stage is a place for real labor, study, energy, effort, industry and hardships and the harvest is the sweet, gentle memory of a golden past. What profession offers so much?"

Preceding the lecture which is scheduled to start at 3 o'clock, there will be an important business session at 2:30 o'clock, at which all members of the club are urged to be present. The meeting will be open to the general public, with a door fee charged to non-club members.


