

SEEBIRT ASSERTS HE WILL ENFORCE PROHIBITION LAW

Republican Candidates Outline Position at Rally in Studebaker Hall.

Bill F. Seebirt, republican nominee for mayor, pledged his efforts to a reform administration, before a gathering of 150 voters, at the republican campaign rally, Friday night in the Studebaker Hall.

Seebirt said in part: "Municipal government is formed to provide health and happiness, moral and physical, for the people of the city. It is government in form, primarily for the purpose of securing happiness and health to the people, there can be no question about the kind of government we must maintain."

"Homer Hanson said recently in one of his statistical reports that South Bend is 120 per cent of what it was in prosperity last year. A friend of mine remarked to me it might be based upon the amount of 'white mule' that is used in South Bend at 75 cents a glass."

"One of the greatest problems our law enforcement officials have is the enforcement of the Volstead act against the sale of intoxicating liquors. It will say the contest is going on just as long as men have appetites for liquor and their greed for gain prompts them to violate and sweep aside every convention of society and satisfy this thirst and desire for gain. It is a relentless fight, and I promise you, if elected, I will engage in that contest to the best of my ability."

"Mrs. Lenn J. Oare, the only woman speaker on the program, said: 'The city election means more to me than the national election. The city administration has affected the business efficiency and the moral character of the men who guide the government of the city. To the women of the city between now and Nov. 8 there lies a responsibility that we cannot shirk as a woman's vote in South Bend, if properly concentrated, would be so great that woman would be a tremendous factor in dominating the morals and health of the city.'

"Our city is growing and becoming more complicated. Elements of sanitation, public health and public entertainment are elements that mothers have to contend with and the only way we can reach these things is through the ballot."

The board, therefore, wishes to express its appreciation of his long and faithful service."

"Appointments and promotions of firemen, caused by Capt. Hartford's death, followed. To Lieut. Percy Alford of the fire department fell the post of the late captain, the charge of No. 7 station. Fireman Andrew Anderson will occupy the post left by Capt. Alford, and Harry Thomas, 243 E. Paris st., was appointed in Anderson's stead. The promotions will go into effect today."

Illinois Boosters Will Meet At 'Y' To Formulate Campaign

A meeting of all persons interested in the \$2,500,000 University of Illinois Memorial Stadium campaign which will be launched Nov. 1 will be held at the Y. M. C. A. tonight. Committees will be organized and plans discussed for the carrying on of the work in this territory. Practically \$1,000,000 has already been pledged by students and it is hoped that the additional \$1,500,000 can be collected from among the alumni and friends of the university.

"On Oct. 29, Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis, Chicago's famous jurist and dictator of American baseball, will be the principal speaker at the gigantic mass meeting on the University of Illinois campus, officially opening the campaign. The new stadium will cover approximately 15 acres and will be the center of a recreational field and playground of nearly 100 acres. It will contain 100 tennis courts, 25 baseball diamonds, 8 football grids, numerous soccer and hockey fields, a polo field, and an artificial ice skating rink."

"In addition to these athletic fields there will be the Stadium Court of Honor, holding a Greek theater seating 10,000 persons. At present there is no place on the campus that is suitable for the holding of pageants, plays, festivals, and the commencement exercises."

William Barentsen Pays \$8,500 for a "Gold Mine" Somewhere in Idaho.

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
