MISSING WITNESS HALTS DUGAN TRIAL

District Attorney Van Nuys Charges Politician With Disappearance.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 10.—Absence of the government's principal witness caused the indefinite postponement today of the trial of William Dugan, Marion drugstore and politician, charged in federal court with violation of the prohibition law.

In asking postponement of the trial, Dist. Atty. Frederick Van Nuys in effect charged that Dugan was responsible for the witness' disappearance, and later the district attorney declared "it is not impossible that Mr. Dugan can checkmate this prosecution by such method."

When addressing the court Mr. Van Nuys said:

"I speak advisedly when I say that this is not the first case in which the defendant Dugan has been charged with crime that when the time came for trial the material witnesses or witness for the prosecution have been missing."

Burns Investigating.

He added that William Burns, chief of the department of justice investigators, was searching for James Lee, the missing witness, and that in time Lee would be in court.

Two cases charging violation of the prohibition law are pending against Dugan. In one he alone is the defendant, and in the other he is charged with conspiracy, along with Henry Lewis, Lewis Irey and John H. Brady, to violate the prohibition law, the cases arising from the finding of a still near Dora, Wash county, some time ago. Irey, the only defendant in court today besides Dugan, pleaded guilty in the conspiracy case. Henry Lewis was said by Mr. Van Nuys to be a fugitive, and John Brady was said to be a prisoner at Michigan City prison.

H. A. Roberts, a lawyer of Marion, with James Noel of this city, appeared in court today as counsel for Dugan, but took no part in the proceedings, except that Mr. Noel declared he knew nothing of Lee but would aid the government, if possible, in getting the witness in court.

BANKERS ASSOCIATION SEEKS CHECK PASSER

NOBLESVILLE, Ind., Dec. 10.—Clinton Loucks, a young farmer living near here, is being sought in connection with an alleged fraudulent scheme by which, it is said, 12 small banks in Hamilton and adjoining counties have lost approximately \$5,000.

Authorities say Loucks would go to various banks and write checks on neighboring institutions for sums of \$200 or more. Banks at Westfield, Sheridan, Lebanon, Whitesboro, Kirklint, Scireville and Kempton are understood to have been lost through operations of Loucks. The matter has been turned over to the Indiana Bankers association.

The authorities have learned that Loucks went to Crofordsville and caught a train west, it was said.

YEGGMEN GET BIG HAUL AT AUSTIN

Secure \$12,000 in Securities From Deposit Vaults at State Bank.

SEYMOUR, Ind., Dec. 10.—Three yeggmens robbed the safety deposit boxes in the Austin State bank near here today of \$12,000 in securities. Between \$200 and \$300 in cash was taken from a small safe and \$250 worth of stamps placed in the safe by the postmaster was also stolen.

COLORED WATER BOY IN HEROIC RESCUE

Quick Action Saves Six-Year-Old Boy From Burning to Death.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 10.—Unusual presence of mind and quick action on the part of Lauro Waters, 15, a colored waterboy who dashed two buckets of water on Harold Parker, six, today when the terrified child, his clothes in flames came running and screaming from his home, undoubtedly saved the boy's life. The Parker boy who was badly burned on the back and shoulders, later was taken to the city hospital by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Harrison Parker. White Waters was working with Harold Parker, Harvey Hodges, colored, rushed into the Parker home and brought out Walter Parker the four year old

brother of Harold who was in bed. Little Walter caused the fire. The brothers were playing in the bedroom of the home. Walter put a coal oil can in the big stove in the room and its explosion splattered oil over Harold. His clothing caught fire and he rushed from the house. Walter, frightened crawled into bed where Hodges found him.

File Huge Suit Against Terre Haute Gas Company

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 10.—A suit asking \$1,750,000 as damages from the Indiana Coke and Gas Co. of Terre Haute, was filed today in federal court here by the Mississippi Valley Iron Co. of St. Louis, which charged that an alleged breach of warranty and contract caused it to close its plant Oct. 25, 1920.

The St. Louis company alleged that it contracted with the Terre Haute company in the summer of 1920 for blast furnace coke to be supplied for one year at \$7.50 a ton, with deliveries not to exceed 400 tons daily. The suit alleges that deliveries were suspended in October, 1920, because objection was made as to the quality of the coke and because the Terre Haute company insisted on cash payment, which is alleged to have been contrary to contract.

State Needs Place To Keep Its Records


