PLAN FOR SPRING BUILDING DISPLAY

Niles Students to Take Part in Show April 29—Defeat St. Joseph Team.

(Special to The News-Times.) NILES, Mich., April 22.—Plans for a spring building show, to be held in the display sheds of the Niles Lumber Co., on the afternoon and evening of April 29, have been completed. Junior students in the manual training department of the Niles high school have been asked to model salubrious dwellings for the occasion, the work being done according to a well-known architect's plans and specifications. Several hundred dollars in prizes will be awarded by M. S. Rudolph, treasurer of the Niles Lumber Co., to the boys completing the most satisfactory dwellings. More than 15 Niles firms have already signified their intention of having displays at the exhibit.

In a one-sided contest in the ball park of the Garden City Park Co., the Niles high school baseball team defeated the St. Joseph nine today by a score of 14-2. A large crowd was present to witness the game, a number of Nilesites fearing that St. Joseph, already victorious by the score in football and basketball, might seek to redeem herself in the great American game.

Launch Campaign.
A campaign to drive out "quacks and fakirs," to eliminate detrimental practices and to build up community health by educating the public in matters pertaining to medicine has been launched by the Berrien County Medical society, working in co-operation with the Michigan State Medical society. According to plans made by the society at its April meeting, speakers will address public meetings from time to time, discussing frankly and opening certain medical questions, and endeavoring to give the people an intimate understanding of the aims of the society. YOUNGSTERS HELD FOR PASSING PHONEY BILLS
DETROIT, Mich., April 22.—Two of the youngest respondents ever brought into court here on a federal charge appeared before United States Commissioner J. S. Hurd today for arraignment on a charge of passing counterfeit money. The youngsters, Freda Rossi, 7, and her brother Seymour Rossi, 13, were ordered held by the grand jury. Their parents, Angelo and Lillian Rossi, also were arraigned and held on the same charge. The children were arrested by secret service men after it is charged, they attempted to pass a counterfeit \$2 bill in a west side department store.

Haynes Will Not Interfere In Detroit Booze Situation
DETROIT, Mich., April 22.—Federal Prohibition Commissioner Roy A. Haynes will take no part in the investigation of local enforcement of the dry law as demanded recently by United States District Judge Arthur J. Tuttle, he indicated in a statement Saturday. Mr. Haynes came here to address a mass meeting Sunday and incidentally to discuss the work of the local prohibition enforcement agencies. The commissioner expressed himself as having the fullest confidence in the local organization and the activities of Prohibition Director James R. Davis. Commissioner Haynes, Director Davis and Police Commissioner Inches are understood to have spent a couple of hours on the Detroit river yesterday in a patrol boat discussing methods of co-operation between the federal and local authorities.

FORD MOTOR CO. TO INCREASE SCHEDULE

DETROIT, April 22.—All previous production records of the Ford Motor Co. will be smashed during the month of May with 120,000 car schedule, the office of Edsel Ford, president, announced today, following a conference of executives. Employment of 5,000 to 10,000 more men is planned.

This schedule means a new car will be made every 6 1/2 seconds for the 27 eight-hour work days. The highest production record was last August when 46,000 employees turned out 109,000 cars. To meet the enormous increase from the present schedule the five day a week plan announced by Edsel Ford as permanent, may be abandoned, officials said. The factory week will be working on a six day a week basis beginning May 1, they believe.

Theft of \$900 Is Laid To Man by His Brother

DOWAGIAC, Mich., April 22.—Fred Williams, Norwood Park, Ill., and his wife, were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Elmer Reynolds, at Cassopolis, Saturday, on charges of larceny of \$900, preferred by his brother James. They were chief mourners at the funeral of their father Isaac, wealthy Newberg farmer, last Sunday. James asserts it was his father's dying request that the brothers not enter the old homestead until after the funeral and that in violation of this wish, Fred went there immediately after the burial. Fred says the \$900 was turned over to him by a James Mich., bank at his late father's request. A special administrator has been appointed to institute a search of the old Newberg home where \$10,000 is believed to have been hidden by the elder Williams who went to his son James' home several weeks ago when he became helpless.

New Probe of Missing Banker's Books Starts

THREE RIVERS, Mich., April 22.—Investigation into the financial affairs of Fred Shoemaker, assistant cashier of the First National bank, who disappeared Tuesday during an audit of his books by the state bank examiner took a new turn Friday. An examination of the books of the St. Joseph County Mutual Fire Insurance company, was started after charges had been made that money had been paid in policies which Shoemaker, president and treasurer of the company, never delivered. The total surcharge at the bank, it was said by the examiners, would be more than \$4,000.

AGED WOMAN STANDS ON TRACK FOR TRAIN

GOSHEN, April 22.—Police and New York Central railroad employees here are endeavoring to learn the identity of an aged woman who twice within a few days has attempted to commit suicide by standing in front of a freight train near the passenger station. The same engineer had stopped his train in each instance when he saw the woman with outstretched arms and facing the locomotive standing in the middle of the track. He led her away, but before he could summon an officer she made her escape.

GAS COMPANY CARRIES FIGHT TO U. S. COURT

INDIANAPOLIS, April 22.—The fight of the Citizens Gas Co. to increase rates in this city was carried into the federal courts today by the company, which asked that the State Public Service Commission be restrained from compelling the company to observe the 90-cent gas rate. The company's action followed that of the Commission denying a hearing of its order, issued yesterday, which refused to increase the rate to \$1.25.

The company's petition in federal court will be heard by three judges, probably next Saturday.

COLUMBUS—A movement started here some time ago for the extraction of oil and meat from soy beans, which it was believed would greatly increase the production of soy beans and open a better market for them in Eastholms and adjoining counties, has been abandoned for the present at least. The reason is that the farmers of the county already have planned their acreage of soy beans and the acreage planned would not suffice for consummation of the movement.

CABINET MAKERS ASK FREIGHT CUT

One-Third Reduction Sought in Appeal to Interstate Commission.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 22.—Reduction by one-third of the freight charges on kitchen cabinets shipped to points in the eastern half of the country from Indiana, where eighty percent of the kitchen cabinets are manufactured, is asked of the Interstate Commerce Commission in a petition at Washington by the Indiana Public Service Commission. The lower rate, which the petition asks to be applied on shipments of less than carload lots, would place the freight charges on the Indiana cabinets on the same basis for the entire country, the state commission said, asserting the rates for points west of the Mississippi being lower than eastern or southern shipments. The petition of the Indiana commission make parties defendant of all railroads in official classification, the territory east of the Mississippi and north of the Ohio, and also all those in southern classification, the district east of the Mississippi and south of the Ohio. In support of the contention for lower rates on less than carload shipments, the Indiana commission says such shipments to western classification is on the basis of first class rates, while elsewhere the freight is one and one-half times first class. "Other commodities of substantially the same and of greater value per pound and per cubic foot," says the commission's petition, "are rated lower in the official and southern classification than kitchen cabinets."

Further, the petition asserts that other commodities of comparative weight a cubic foot, and more susceptible to damage in transit, have lower rates than for the eastern

half of the country than the kitchen cabinets, and that the "unduly high rating produces freight charges so high as to seriously restrict sales and production" on Indiana products.

BOOTLEGGERS ESCAPE IN SHOWER OF BULLETS

LOGANSPOUT, April 22.—Joe Hubbard and John Carter, alleged bootleggers, escaped from the authorities here today in a shower of bullets after it is alleged, they resisted arrest. It was said that more than 20 shots were fired at the men.

Carter and Hubbard alleged to have opened fire on the authorities as they ran from the home of Carter, east of the city. Three stills and some mash and liquor were seized. A number of deputies are searching for the two men.

ICE BOUND FREIGHTERS MAKE SLIGHT PROGRESS

SAULT STE MARIE, Mich., April 22.—Progress of the fleet of freighters caught in the ice bank of White Fish Point during the storm Thursday still was blocked today by the heavy ice flows, according to a wireless message from one of the vessels. A shift of wind, it was said, would release the steamers. Nothing has been heard here of the fate of the steamer Colonial, abandoned by her crew after she was disabled in Lake Huron. The crew, taken off by the coast guard, reached shore after a hazardous 48-hour trip.

TAKES POISON

INDIANAPOLIS, April 22.—Mrs. Pearl Moulton of Indianapolis is in a serious condition as a result of having drunk poison this afternoon at her apartment. She is said to be the wife of a physician who lives at Texarkana, Ark. It is said Mr. and Mrs. Moulton had been separated.
