

GAS COMPANY TO EXPEND \$150,000 IN IMPROVEMENTS

To Rehabilitate Distribution System of Plant—Financial Reorganization.

Improvements which will result in the expenditure of \$150,000 have been begun at the local plant of the Northern Indiana Gas and Electric Co. in order to handle the abnormal consumption of gas during certain hours, it was announced by Guy M. Johnson, manager, last night.

Rehabilitation of the entire distribution system will require uniform pressure, and an increase in both condensation and purification facilities are included in the program.

New mains will be laid wherever necessary in South Bend and Mishawaka, a large circular purification box, almost doubling the present capacity, will be added, and an improved washer-scrubber condenser installed.

MARKET SUMMARY

NEW YORK, April 28.—Stimulated by progress in the steel merger negotiations, and by the more encouraging outlook at Genoa, prices on the New York Stock exchange today scored substantial recoveries from the low levels touched on Thursday's sharp decline.

Sentiment at the start of trading was cheered by the action of the Bethlehem Steel directors in continuing the regular dividend and by President Grace's constructive outline of the industry's immediate future. After a higher opening the general drift of prices continued upward throughout the session and the closing levels were around the day's best.

While the volume of dealing showed considerable shrinkage the million share mark was exceeded for the 21st consecutive session. Rails showed a better tone following their break on the reported cut in freight rates to be announced soon by the commission. This proposal was probably the cause of a large measure to a realization that a few intelligent reductions in rates on special commodities would not be an unmitigated evil for many of the railroads.

In the first place, a number of the roads, especially the trans-continental lines, are suffering severely from the too high rates which drive a great deal of competitive business to the water lines. The weak showing of some of the transcontinentals in recent months have not been the result of a want of profit in the business handled so much as a want of the business itself.
