BRITISH GOVERNMENT TO RATIFY TREATIES

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The British government, it was learned today, will ratify all of the treaties negotiated at the recent Washington conference, with the exception of the navy treaty, by simple act of the privy council and without submission to either house of parliament. The navy treaty is regarded as proper for consideration by parliament for the reason that authorization must be had for the scrapping of many ships and other reductions and changes in the naval establishment involving great appropriations.

LIQUOR ON TRANSPORT LEADS TO NAVAL PROBE

NORFOLK, Va., June 12.—A naval board of investigation was busy Monday endeavoring to establish responsibility for the presence on board the naval transport Sirius of 67 cases of foreign liquor found in the cargo unloaded at the navy yard Saturday. Rear Admiral Hugh Rodman, commander of the Fifth naval district, expressed the opinion that the outlawed beverages were the work of a powerful ring involving more than a few naval men with headquarters probably at Norfolk.

Y., in changing the sex of banana flies, adds valuable evidence to the theory that sex can be pre-determined and even changed.
