
And this season's suits of silks, satins, velvets, batiks and lace, with corsages, jewels, feathers and fur, are all the direct descendants of his line of propagation.

White silk stockings are worn with brocaded white satin slippers, or plain or brocaded silver ones. Headresses and veils are of lace or tulle with an indefinite number of variations in trimming, although clusters of orange blossoms still are favored.

LACE LINGERIE
Lace corsets are not as impractical as they sound. They are of a strong quality of mesh, and are worn so loosely and comfortably that there is little strain upon them. Lace brassieres are most desirable for hot weather and are shown in attractive styles.

DENVER GIRL TELLS DOPE RING SECRETS

Juvenile Court Hears Weird Story That Drug Peddlers Abduct Girls.

DENVER, June 17.—A lurid tale of how she was kidnaped by members of a "dope peddling ring," taken to a squalid shack on the outskirts of Denver, starved into submission and assaulted was related to Juvenile court officials here by a seventeen-year-old Denver schoolgirl, whose name is being withheld.

The girl declared that the "dope ring" gang abducts and holds captive young girls, giving them morphine and cocaine in an effort to "create" a new market for their illicit traffic and frequently force their captives onto the street in a life of shame.

Juvenile court and welfare officers have investigated the story and verified many details, including the discovery of the shack in which the girl claims to have been held a prisoner, as well as other "dens" in isolated sections of the city.

That the shack in which the unidentified girl was mistreated was the headquarters of a "school" to force the use of drugs upon young girls to the belief expressed by welfare officers, and police are investigating the activities of the gang in search for clues to the disappearance of and assaults upon numerous young Denver girls in recent weeks.

Shack is Located.
Juvenile court attaches found the shack in which the girl was held captive in a grove of trees just outside the city limits—a small, squat building, with heavily screened windows, and containing two rooms, barren of all furniture, except a brass bed and bed clothing.

Stripped of practically all her clothing, the girl told officers, she spent most of her time in the bed in an effort to keep warm. Her meals consisted mostly of sandwiches brought from downtown by members of the gang. She was given much "dope" and moonshine whiskey, she said.

The girl declared she was captured by members of the gang in a downtown street, taken to the shack and kept a prisoner for six weeks, during which time she became a drug addict.

The girl escaped from her captors by jumping through a window of the squalid shack while her captors were all absent. She reported her terrible experience to Juvenile court officials, who now have her in custody.
