

Indiana and Michigan PLAN GEOLOGICAL SURVEY OF MINES

State Board Makes Extensive Preparations for Summer's Work.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 17.—Extensive plans for summer work in connection with the state geological survey are being formulated by Dr. W. N. Logan, state geologist, according to an announcement made today by Richard Lieber, director of conservation.

A field party will study the geological occurrence and conditions of the coal beds in the south central part of the Indiana coal field, the area surveyed to include parts of Greene, Martin, Daviess, Knox, Sullivan and several other counties, it was said. The party will be directed by Dr. Logan, and will include M. A. Harrell, R. E. Earey, W. P. Rawles, G. G. Bartle, F. E. Madenwald and R. Hunt. Subjects to be studied, it was added, are the conditions of the coal strata, correlation of the coal and other regions, collection of samples of coal and other economic products for laboratory investigation, and study of structural conditions of the area, and determination as far as possible of the structures favorable to the accumulation of oil and gas.

Dr. E. R. Cummings expects to continue his studies of the Silurian and Ordovician formations of Indiana. Dr. C. A. Mallott will spend considerable time in the counties of the driftless area along the Ohio river. Dr. W. M. Tucker, hydrologist of the division will study the water conditions of the lake region about Laporte, and Dr. J. R. Reeves will continue his studies of the oil shales of the state.

The remainder of the geological division's program of summer field work includes a study of distribution and composition of ancient lake beaches of Lake Michigan area in Indiana by George Creswell; a study of strata of the Knobstone area in Brown county by Glenn Lee and a study of the physiographic conditions of Monroe county by Arch Addington.

DELEGATES ARRIVE FOR CHURCH MEET

Missionaries and Officers of Church of God at Anderson for Convention.

ANDERSON, Ind., June 17.—Missionaries and officers of the Church of God from all over the world are here for the twelfth annual international camp meeting, which will open tomorrow and continue for one week.

Regular services will be held three times daily, at 10:30, 2:30 and 7:30 o'clock, it has been announced. J. W. Beyer, of Fresno, Calif., C. E. Brown of Detroit and W. D. McCaw of Baltimore are to be among the principal speakers, it was said.

Church men and women who have served in Japan, British East Africa, Syria and British West India, as well as those who have confined their work to the United States, the Canal Zone and Canada, are among those here for the meeting. Detailed reports of the work carried on by the church throughout the world and information as to the general conditions in the various countries in which they are stationed will be given the missionaries, it was said.

Two hundred tents have been erected at the camp grounds in Park Place to accommodate part of the visitors. It is expected that by Tuesday approximately 3000 members of the Church of God will be in Anderson for the meeting.

COMPLETE PLANS FOR EPISCOPAL CONFERENCE

SYRACUSE, Ind., June 17.—Arrangements have been completed for conference of the church workers of the Episcopal church, June 19 to June 24.

Among the speakers will be, Rev. McVeigh Harrison, Miss Laura Boyer, V. F. B. Drane, archdeacon of Yukon, (Alaska), Miss Sarah Ashhurst and Rev. Charles Bridgeman, assistant secretary for work among the foreign born in New York City.

DEDICATE MEMORIAL TO FORMER LEGION HEAD

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., June 17.—A memorial to the late Col. Frederick W. Galbraith, Jr., of Cincinnati, former national commander of the American legion, who was killed in an automobile accident here last year, was dedicated today. The memorial is a stone boulder with a bronze tablet. Among those who participated in the dedication were Gov. McCray, Hanford MacNider, national commander of the legion, and Mrs. Lowell F. Hohart, of the American Legion auxiliary.

SEEK WOMAN'S SAVINGS; BURIED ON HER FARM

ENGLISH, June 17.—A search was begun Saturday about the farm of Florence Bottomly, who died a few days ago, for his life time savings, which are believed to be secreted somewhere on the place.

Mr. Bottomly, who was 79 years old, is said by relatives to have told them just before his death he had secreted his savings somewhere on the farm, but did not indicate the place. His funeral was held yesterday.

INDIANAPOLIS FACTORY FIRE OVERCOMES FOUR

INDIANAPOLIS, June 17.—Four firemen were overcome here Saturday afternoon while fighting a fire at the Commercial Box company. All were quickly revived and continued their work. Emil T. Schmidt, proprietor of the company said the fire was of incendiary origin. The damage to the plant was estimated at \$50,000.

The condition of clover hay in Indiana was 94 percent of normal on June 1. For alfalfa it was 95 percent of normal.

ROBBERS TAKE CLOTHES FROM SYRACUSE STORE

SYRACUSE, June 17.—Burglars early Friday robbed the Star Clothing store here, hauling away a motor truck load of merchandise, consisting largely of clothing, shoes and notions.

The robbery was discovered when the store was opened Friday morning. Sheriff C. B. Moon of Warsaw, was summoned and is making an investigation.

He was informed Friday that confederates of the robbers investigated the nightwatchman to leave the vicinity of the store and go to an automobile garage.

HOLD TWELVE MINERS ON BAIL OF \$1,000

The warrants were issued at the request of wagon mine owners who were said to have been molested by the miners.

ATTEMPT AT SUICIDE FAILS; MAY LOSE EYE

INDIANAPOLIS, June 17.—Thomas King, sales manager for the Diamond Chain Co., failed in an attempt to commit suicide Friday at the South Grove Golf links club house although he shot himself in the head with a revolver. He will probably lose the sight of one eye.

A note which he had written expressed fear that he was becoming insane. Friends said he had suffered a nervous breakdown recently.

MODERNISTS WIN EVERY MOTION AT BAPTIST MEETING

Fundamentalists Plan Campaign to Further Their Cause—\$10,000 Raised.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., June 17.—Leaders of fundamentalist group of the northern Baptist convention, defeated at every turn in the deliberations, tonight announced that they would carry on an extensive campaign to further their cause and that \$10,000 had been pledged to start the work.

Leaders who attended the fundamentalist meeting included the Rev. M. P. Boynton, of Chicago; Curtis Lee Lows, of New York, publisher of the Watchman Examiner, the fundamentalist weekly newspaper; Dr. J. C. Masee of Boston, and Dr. W. P. Riley of St. Paul, Minn.

Modernists also are preparing a campaign to offset the publicity of the fundamentalist group. It was said, but no definite announcement had been made.

Defeated in their efforts to have the convention adopt a creed which would be binding on the churches of the denomination, the fundamentalists did not place a list of officers before the convention today as had been previously announced. The Rev. Frederick E. Taylor, of Indianapolis, was elected president of the convention without opposition.

The convention before adopting the report of the budget committee, amended it so that the Baptists would donate \$25,000 to the federated churches of America instead of \$15,000 as recommended by the committee.

Services will be held in the convention hall tomorrow for the delegates. Dr. W. S. Abernethy, pastor of the church in Washington, D. C., of which Taylor is a member, will deliver the sermon. The convention will be in session Monday and Tuesday, at which time it is expected to name the next convention city.
