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COUNTY TAXES FOR AND HALF MILLIONS MAY NET OVER TWO

Schools of South Bend Receive Heaviest Portion with \$685,130.

St. Joseph county tax payers and corporations paid in a total of \$2,476,426.61 at the May installment.

Of this sum the schools of South Bend received the heaviest portion, their share being \$685,130.91.

The distribution of taxes was sent to the treasurer of the county.

New Carlisle gets \$2,467.33, Walkerton, \$3,496.70; North Liberty, \$3,678.50; Lukeville, \$7,118.60; Osceola, \$9,111.83; Roseland, \$23,544.44.

The distribution as to townships follows: Olive, \$20,262.37; Warren, \$10,644.88; German, \$5,924.94; Clay, \$15,194.74; Harris, \$5,314.97; Penn, \$41,131.45; Portage, \$21,114.15; Adams, \$5,838.91; Greene, \$13,226.28; Union, \$19,270.16; Liberty, \$20,303.69; Madison, \$15,888.84; Lincoln, \$8,547.19.

The distribution of state funds follows: State tax, \$14,364.94; benevolent institution fund, \$65,847.43; state school fund, \$81,856.88; state educational institution fund, \$54,483.17; vocational educational fund, \$5,437.93; state highway commission, \$36,831.97; state soldiers memorial fund, \$8,586.45; agricultural experiment station funds, \$4,329.16; state teachers pension fund, \$2,159.73.

In the distribution of taxes for the county will be seen a new fund, that of county sinking fund which is \$22,844.11. Still another heavy item and one which caused the tax rate to go up last year, is the general bonds and interest at \$94,916.72.

Other figures in connection with the distribution include county tax of \$179,737.32; interest on county bonds of \$10,977.58; township tax, \$17,894.89; tuition tax, \$479,711.91; special school tax, \$225,774.21; school house bonds, \$197,498.59; township poor, \$17,759.60; local vocational educational fund, \$17,452.66; school building sanitary fund, \$19,823.79.

The distribution of funds for the cities includes: Police, \$1,194,424.33; street lighting, \$1,194,424.33; library, \$40,218.17; corporation sinking fund, \$3,468.00; public water and electric system, \$3,468.99; street tax, \$150.67; park department, \$3,186.87.

South Bend citizens have ever been willing to be anxious to assist a worthy cause. This fact was clearly shown during the World War when at different times, the appeal to buy Liberty bonds was made by Uncle Sam.

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400 TEACHERS NOW ENROLLED IN N. D. SUMMER SCHOOL

487 Enrolled in All, for Six-Week Course at Notre Dame—Begin Tuesday.

With an enrollment of 487, classes in the Summer School at Notre Dame university started Tuesday, and will continue until August 5. The enrollment this year is slightly larger than that of 1921. Of the 487 enrolled for the six weeks course, 400 are teachers in various educational institutions taking advanced courses in education.

Of the 400 teachers, about 250 are Sisters from various religious communities, coming here from Michigan, Wisconsin, Ohio, Kentucky, Indiana and Kansas. Others enrolled are students of the university who are pursuing their studies this summer to gain additional credits or to make up back work upon which credits depend.

The university is offering courses in all the regular branches and several special courses for the summer school sessions only. A number of additions have been made to the faculty for the season and among them being Rev. Bartholomew Eastman, Ed. D. Duryodola seminar; Rev. Michael O'Shea, A. M. graduate of Notre Dame in 1904; Rev. Schabert of Louvain, Belgium, who are giving courses in philosophy; Dr. Purcell of Catholic university, Washington, D. C., in history; Dr. O'Gorman of Idaho and Mr. Dubois of the South Bend High school, courses in education; Rev. George Albertson, Ph. D., of Catholic university, in botany; and Rev. Peter Forestall of Texas, who is giving courses in Spanish.

Offer New Course. A feature of the courses offered at this year's session of the summer school is one on "The World's Great Books" given by Rev. John Cavanaugh, C. S. C. The enrollment in Father Cavanaugh's class is the largest of any of the courses offered. This is a new course, being offered this year for the first time.

Rev. James Reddy, former rector of Sorin hall and vice president of the university, who is now stationed at St. Austin, Texas, will offer to the summer session of Notre Dame to complete the requirements for his Ph. D. degree.

It is possible that a complete tabulation of late registrations may bring the total at the summer school above the 500 which would be the record figure for Notre Dame summer school. It will also be a tribute to the success of the institution, inasmuch as most of the enrollment is drawn from the ranks of teachers who are taking the opportunity of the summer session offered on various educational subjects to improve themselves as instructors.

BOARD CONSIDERS NUMEROUS OFFERS. Receiving bids and petitions for new street improvements occupied almost the entire session of Tuesday's meeting of the board of public works. One remonstrance was filed and a petition affecting the type of paving on the alley at Olive and Broadway.

Restraint Order. Bids were received for grade, curb and walk improvements on Eckman st., from Michigan st. to the Vandalla tracks and on Bergan st. from Portage ave. to Olive st.; for pavement on alley between lots 3, 4, 5 and 6 in Mease addition, from Laporte ave. to Lincoln way W., and for pipe sewer on O'Brien st., from Washington av. to the first alley south of Kenwood st. The bids were referred to the city engineer for tabulation.

Bids covering the proposed pipe sewer on Kessler blvd. from Rose st. to Portage Heights were not opened because of the restraining order being filed against the board.

Petitions were received and resolutions ordered for pavement on Dayton and Milton sts. from Miami st. to Mumford st.; grade, curb and walk on Randolph st. from Lear st. to the first alley west of Marine st. and pipe sewer on Scott st. from Indiana av. north to the Vandalla tracks. In addition a resolution was ordered for a sub-trunk sewer on Dale st. from Broadway to Indiana av.

The Remonstrance. Petitions seeking the paving of Kendall st. between Indiana av. and Calvert st., and for a sewer on Columbia st. between Wenger and Paris sts. were filed.

A remonstrance was received by the board against the paving of Marine st. between Indiana av. and Calvert st. Action on the proposed improvement was held up for a later hearing.

A petition signed by 21 names purporting to be interested property holders, delayed adoption of contract for the pavement of the alley north of Lincoln way W., running from Leland av. to the first alley east of Wood st. The signers sought to change the type of paving, originally specified as concrete, to asphaltic concrete.
