

BURY ME WITH YOUR PICTURE, SUICIDE'S NOTE

Bullet Ends Romance of First Sight Love for 'Girl of His Dreams.'

CHICAGO, Aug. 16.—Jilted by the girl of his love dreams, the girl for whom he developed a mad infatuation at first sight, Tom Kepler, 19, world's champion telegrapher, scribbled a tragic message of his blighted romance and fired a bullet into his head in the front vestibule of an apartment house today. Physicians said he had little hope of recovery.

The "dream girl" is Miss Olga Stobbe, 15, of Canton, Ohio, chief operator there for the telegraph company, who came here last Friday on a vacation and who was visiting a friend at the address where Kepler lived the shot.

Only yesterday Kepler broke the world's record receiving the Morse code, taking 219 words in 2 minutes and 53 seconds. He had followed Miss Stobbe here from Canton, his home town, and had secured work as a telegrapher at Waukegan.

"Either kiss me just once before I am buried, out of respect to the love that is still yours, or have enclosed with my body the picture of yourself you promised me," his last note read in A.

"He was madly in love with me," Miss Stobbe said after the police had taken her to the station for questioning.

"I met him in Canton, O., two years ago while he was working as a telegrapher. He called to see me many times. He wrote me many fervent letters.

"But I never encouraged him. I did not love him.

ACCIDENT BUREAU GETS INTO ACTION

Special Prosecutor Quizzes Witnesses in Detroit Accident Probe.

DETROIT, Aug. 16.—The accident bureau established by Paul V. Voorhies, prosecuting attorney, to investigate all traffic mishaps, got into action Tuesday for the first time, when John V. Brennan, assistant prosecuting attorney in charge of the bureau, questioned witnesses called at the inquest over Mrs. Josephine Bosquet, killed by an automobile July 15.

Mrs. Bosquet, who was 58 years old and lived at 6085 Hurbit av., was hit by a machine driven by Sam Cushman. The accident occurred at Holcomb and East Jefferson av. at 6:45 a. m. while Mrs. Bosquet was waiting for a trolley car.

The testimony to the effect that a street flusher, operated by William H. Lacey, came along and threw water into the safety zone, frightening Mrs. Bosquet, who stepped from the zone directly into the path of Cushman's automobile. The coroner's jury held Cushman blameless.

GOVERNMENT GIVES AID TO ERADICATE T. B. FROM CATTLE

Progress Reported in Killing Off Germs From Ranges of Many Counties.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—Efforts for many states to eradicate tuberculosis among cattle has gained such headway that officials of the department of agriculture regard the end of the fight against the great cattle plague as a practical possibility.

Many counties are now raising large amounts of money for this purpose, the department states, and the clean counties have set an example that stimulates others to follow. Progressive communities are beginning to realize that they cannot have diseased herds and expect to compete with farmers and breeders in localities that are entitled to advertise that all of their cattle are free of tuberculosis.

Oregon Takes Lead. Oregon now has seven counties in this class: Washington and Wisconsin, four each; Michigan and Mississippi, three each; Nebraska and Montana, two each; and Idaho, North Carolina, Utah, Virginia and West Virginia, one each.

Intensive work directed toward the eradication of tuberculosis is now being done by 125 counties in 22 States. In this list Missouri has 18 counties; Nebraska, 15; North Carolina, 14; Maine, 11, and New York, 10. Preliminary work is being done in 256 counties and 79 communities in 33 States. Iowa has 21 counties in this list; North Carolina, 30; Idaho, 26; Kentucky, 28; Oregon, 23; New York, 17, and Nevada and Wisconsin, 10 each. Forty communities in Georgia, 31 in South Carolina and a few in Louisiana and Vermont have started eradication work.

Michigan Appropriates Money. Michigan seems to be leading in the amounts of money appropriated by county authorities to assist the federal government and the state in eradicating the disease.

To date the largest appropriation made by any county in the country is the \$15,000 fund voted by the county commissioners of Huron county, Michigan, according to available records. Other appropriations in Michigan are given as follows: Eaton county, \$8,000; Calhoun county, \$9,000; Oceana, \$4,000; Clinton, \$8,000; Muskegon, \$5,000; and Monroe, \$5,000. Hillsdale county, the first in the country to have all cattle tested, has made an additional appropriation of \$3,500 to continue the work through the second year.

North Carolina Follows Suit. The board of supervisors in a number of counties in North Carolina have made appropriations to assist in fighting tuberculosis on the "area plan." Some Kentucky counties have used money for this purpose from the general tax levy. In Missouri, where a large number of counties are doing area work, the county courts appropriate money to assist in paying for animals slaughtered because of being infected with tuberculosis. Nebraska is also making long strides in the area work. California was one of the last states to enter into co-operative work with the agriculture department, but the work is now being carried on actively in two counties.
