CHURCH COUNCIL TO MEET AT CAPITAL

Meeting of Federal Body Will Open at Indianapolis on December 13.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 13.—Preliminary arrangements for an annual meeting of the executive committee of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America in Indianapolis December 13, 14 and 15, were made Saturday by Dr. Herbert L. Willett, of Chicago, director of the conference of the Indianapolis Church Federation.

The meeting of the executive committee of the Federal Council of Churches will bring to Indianapolis 150 of the most prominent Protestant churches of America, including Robert E. Speer, president of the council, representatives of the thirty-two denominations co-operating in the council, heads of the twenty commissioners on various phases of religious activity working under the direction of the council, and church federation secretaries.

Headquarters of the meeting will be in the Hotel Severin. Dr. Willett announced, and sessions will be held at one of the downtown churches of the city.

The Federal Council, it was explained, consists of about 400 representatives of the co-operating denominations. These representatives meet once every four years, the last meeting being held at Boston about two years ago. The executive committee of the council, consisting of one representative from each of the co-operating denominations, and officials of the council, meets every year. An administrative committee, consisting of about thirty persons, meets monthly in the New York offices of the council.

At the annual meeting of the executive committee officials of the council, make reports of the preceding year's work and determine policies and plans for the coming year. Sessions of the executive committee during the day are devoted to formal business matters, but are open to persons wishing to attend. During the meeting here public mass meetings will be held on the three evenings the committee is in session. Dr. J. Ross Stevenson, of the Princeton Theological Seminary, and Ozora S. Davis, president of the Chicago Theological Seminary, will speak on the theme, "Evangelism" Wednesday evening. Dr. Ernest F. Tittle, of Evanston, Ill., and Dr. John R. Cunningham, of the University of Wisconsin, will make addresses on the social mission of the church Thursday evening. Bishop Charles Brent, of the Episcopal church, head of the chaplains during the World War, and Robert E. Speer will make addresses Friday evening on the church and international questions.

The Federal Council is the principal agency of co-operation between Protestant churches in America and speaks in behalf of thirty-two denominations on questions of social justice, race relations, international questions, evangelism, mercy and relief, and religious education. It spends annually approximately \$250,000 in its operations.

"Marrying Squires" Have "Gentlemen's Agreement"

JEFFERSONVILLE, Ind., Nov. 13.—Election of five new justices of the peace, among Jeffersonville's "marrying squires," apparently will not mean a return to the old days when justices and their "runners" competed openly for business. The five new justices, including a six who was re-elected, are planning to follow the plan of a "gentlemen's agreement" which the present corps of six found efficient. It has lowered expenses by permitting one office to serve the six as a "matrimonial parlor," has done away with the splitting of fees with the clerk, his deputies or "runners," has made the work easier by permitting the "magistrate" to serve in rotation, with two always on duty; has prevented fee cutting which used to reduce the standard fee from \$5 to \$5 to as low as 50 cents, and has removed the supposed necessity of seeking out persons intending to marry, formerly conducted not only at the ferry dock and interurban station here, but also across the river, and 12-24 miles in the county courts house in Louisville with a view to diverting couples from that city to Jeffersonville.

Alonzo F. Paddock was re-elected. The five new justices are Herman Hove, a newspaper man, Benson R. Crosby, a former justice, William Long, former sheriff, Jermon Sweet, and William Dorsey.

INDIANA TO OBSERVE BETTER VISION WEEK. INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 13.—Better Vision week will be observed in Indiana during the week of November 20, Dr. H. E. Woodard, secretary of the Indiana Optometric association, which is sponsoring the observance, announced Saturday. Parent-Teacher organizations, civic and industrial clubs, and public school officials have been asked to aid in the observance.

R. C. Augustine, of Decatur, Ill., president emeritus of the American Optometric association, will speak at Indianapolis, Ft. Wayne, Evansville and Marion. Other meetings are to be held during the week.

Pastor Breaks Up Spirit Meeting by Flashing Light

MARION, Ind., Nov. 13.—Two prominent Marion ministers, the Rev. W. E. Moore, pastor of the First Christian church, and the Rev. D. L. Woodward, pastor of the First Baptist church, Friday night attended a meeting where spirits were supposed to be talking to the dead. Mr. Woodward flashed a light which he said broke up the meeting. More than 30 prominent citizens, who were in attendance, the ministers said, were seated around the table in the room of a home in North Marion.

The lights were turned out. Everyone had been cautioned against a light of any kind because it interfered with the spirits and affected the health of the medium, it was said. The spirits were supposed to talk through the trumpet moving about the room.

Mr. Woodward said a voice told a minister in the room that "his wife wanted to talk with him." The minister, whose wife died recently, said he asked for the name of his wife. He asserted the name was not given, but the voice said "your wife and baby are here and want to talk to you."

Mr. Woodward said the minister replied: "My baby is in North Carolina and not here." Mr. Woodward, who is corroborated by Mr. Moore, said the spirit was the medium talking through the trumpet.

"I will place my reputation on this statement of the fact," Mr. Woodward said, "and will assume full responsibility for the statement." He said when he flashed his light the medium appeared to swoon, but he quieted the persons in the room. Both minister said when the lights were turned out the persons sat around the table and the spirits began to appear.

DEFEATED CANDIDATE TO REQUEST RECOUNT

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Nov. 13.—A recount of the vote in the fifth congressional district will be asked by Charles H. Bidaman, Democrat, defeated candidate for representative in the congress, regardless of the majority Everett Sanders, Republican, receives in the official tabulation of the state election commissioners at Indianapolis, Bidaman said Saturday when told the official tabulation gave Sanders a majority of 1,011 votes instead of 213 votes.

"It makes no difference if the official tabulation shows a majority of 100 or 1,500, we are going to prosecute the case we have started," Bidaman said. "No doubt the figure giving Sanders a majority of 1,011 is correct as far as the returns are concerned, but I confidently believe that a recount of the ballots in Putnam and Clay counties alone will bear me out in my declaration that I was duly elected to the congress last Tuesday, and will place a sufficient number of votes to my credit to seat me in the congress," he asserted.

Petitions probably will be filed in a few days in the various counties asking for a recount.

TO FIGHT MOVEMENT FOR BLUE SUNDAYS. INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 13.—(By U. P.)—A counter attack against the drive for blue Sundays in Indiana was started here today.

Sanford B. Horton, secretary of the Religious Liberty Association of Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin, came to Indianapolis to inaugurate a campaign against the church drive in behalf of blue Sunday law enforcement.
