

PRESENT ERSKINE WITH RESOLUTIONS ON GIFT TO CITY

Studebaker Corp. President Showered With Thanks for Gift of Park to City.

A talk on the work of the Anti-Tuberculosis League by Mrs. Ira Couch Wood, director of the McCormick Memorial fund, and the presentation to Albert R. Erskine, president of the Studebaker corp., of a parchment resolution of thanks for return for his donation of Erskine park to the city, featured the joint luncheon of the Rotary and Kiwanis clubs at the Oliver hotel Wednesday noon.

Erskine, who is an honorary member of the Rotary club, was applauded for his generosity and foresight in local civic matters, by Ward Mack, president of the Rotary club and who presided at the luncheon and was given a great ovation when tendered the parchment resolution. The Studebaker chief responded with words of appreciation for the gift and offered much praise for the Rotary club.

Declaring that instead of studying and trying to locate the tubercular germs, the Tubercular League was getting at the source of the disease and preventing it by building up healthy bodies, Mrs. Wood appealed to the clubs to support the Christmas sale of the "health bonds."

Much praise for the local Oliver Fresh Air school and the work of the local chapter of the Anti-Tuberculosis League, was voiced by the speaker. "By feeding under-nourished children and giving them vigorous and aggressive health, no place will be left for the growth of tubercular germs," Mrs. Wood said.

"I don't know how many of you men who are so prominent in local business circles were left money with which to start your enterprises with but without health, you would have been practically helpless," Mrs. Wood declared. "Help us give this great asset to thousands of children so that they and the nation may be ready to take advantage of all opportunities" was the speaker's parting plea.

Next week another joint luncheon of the two clubs will be held at the Oliver with Sir Harry Jauder as guest. It was announced.

RUM TOPER KILLS MOTHER-IN-LAW

JEFFERSONVILLE, Ind., Nov. 29.—(By I. N. S.)—Crazed by drink and remorse at heavy gambling losses, Charles E. Manly, age 50, shot and killed his mother-in-law, Mrs. Eliza Murphy, age 70, at her home here late yesterday evening. Manly, who is said to have been angered when Mrs. Murphy was made the sole beneficiary of \$10,000 war risk insurance on his nephew who died in army service, absented himself from his home over Sunday and returned with a new pistol and remarked he was "going to clean out the gang."

His wife, Mrs. Gertrude Manly, says when she told her husband to wash his face he replied: "No use, the next time I am washed will be in an undertaker's."

Relatives, fearing trouble, went for the police but before the officers reached the house Manly broke down a door and shot the aged woman in spite of the presence and efforts of her husband, Nicholas Murphy, to beat him off with a club. Manly then turned the gun on himself and died almost instantly.

BOXING COMMISSION MAY BE DISSOLVED

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 29.—The city boxing commission may pass out of existence if Theodore Bernd and Benjamin Thompson resign. The commission is composed of seven city councilmen and the only two now serving on it, declaring they would not serve under any circumstances.

If Bernd and Thompson resign the commission would not have the required seven members and a new ordinance would have to be passed creating one of five members instead of seven, of which it is now composed.

ANTI-CHRISTIAN VILLAGE BURNED

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 29.—(By I. N. S.)—Several villages have been burned in an anti-Christian outbreak which is taking place in Thrace, said advices to this city today.

The Greeks are sending reinforcements to the Gumilina district to suppress the anti-Greek forces that number 5,000. The trouble is spreading.

MOVIE DICTATOR SPEEDS TO HOME

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 29.—Will H. Hays, head of the motion picture industry, passed through here today enroute to Sullivan, Ind., to eat turkey with his family tomorrow. "I am thankful that I'm going home for my first Thanksgiving dinner in years," Hays said.

TURKEY'S ENVOYS BOLT PEACE MEET

Mohammedan Delegates to Lausanne Conference Quit Commission.

LAUSANNE, Nov. 29.—(By I. N. S.)—Angered by the Allies' new plans for demilitarization of the Aegean islands, the Turks withdrew this afternoon from the sub-commission of the near east peace conference dealing with the future status of islands of the Turkish coast. The Turks demanded sovereignty over the islands, claiming that Greece might attempt to use them as war bases.

John DeKay, an American representing an Anglo-Franco-American oil syndicate, said to have concessions in Anatolia, Mesopotamia and Mosul, formerly privately owned by heirs of Former Sultan Abdul Hamid, is said to have been favorably received by the Turkish peace envoys.

LEADER OF KLAN IGNORES CRITICS

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—(By I. N. S.)—Rev. Dr. Oscar D. Haywood, national klöckard for the Ku Klux Klan and head of the organization in New York, today adopted a policy of treating the critics of himself and the Klan with silent contempt.

The minister, whose removal as Evangelist of Cavalry Baptist church, will be demanded by the congregation tonight by the pastor, Rev. Dr. John C. Straton, said he was "through with talking."

"I will never again have anything to say to the newspapers," he added.

The klöckard wearily indicated that he thought it a waste of time, for he said he would ignore a resolution adopted last night by the city council, approving Mayor Hylan's stand against the Klan.

The resolution crackles with such terms as "outlaw organization," "bomb throwers," "cranks," "diabolical," "scavengers and profiteers."

DOCTORS EXHUME THREE BODIES

CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—(By I. N. S.)—Three more bodies of alleged poison victims were exhumed today by coroner's chemist, William D. McNally in his investigation into the strange cases of Mrs. Tillie Klimek and Mrs. Nellie Surmer Koulik, indicted for two murders.

One of the bodies was that of a former sweetheart of Mrs. Klimek and the other two were the bodies of twins of Mrs. Surmer-Koulik.

BANDITS LOOT LONSDALE BANK

FAIRBAULT, Minn., Nov. 29.—More than \$25,000 in loot, \$7,000 cash, the balance in Liberty bonds, was obtained by robbers who entered the State bank of Lonsdale, seven miles from here, early today. An acetylene torch with which the safe had been cut was found. No trace of the bandits has been found.
